OUR STORY

The World Literacy Foundation Australia (WLF) is a national charity committed to improving literacy skills for children and young people living in disadvantaged and underserved Indigenous communities throughout Australia. We also support 20 low-income communities in South Australia, Victoria, and New South Wales and three Indigenous communities in Far North Queensland and Northern Territory. In addition, WLF has adopted two overseas literacy projects in Africa (Sun Books) and Colombia (Aprende Leyendo).

In 2024-25, across Australia, we provided 165,000 children's books, 3,850 educational resources, 2,400 reading classes, 15,000 hours of volunteer literacy tutoring and we reached 55,000 parents with community education, awareness and empowered them to be their child's first teacher.

TELL ME MORE...

All our work is aimed to improve the foundational literacy skills of children from low income backgrounds who are struggling to read.

Founded in 2011 by Andrew Kay, 1998 Victorian of the Year, we aim to eradicate illiteracy by 2040. Over the past 13 years, we have forged collaborative partnerships with other WLF affiliates across USA, UK, Latin America, Sub-Saharan Africa, and Canada.

In 2024-25, we provided 200 hundreds of free bilingual Indigenous digital children's books in local languages and English to help bridge the literacy gap in remote communities in the Northern Territory and Queensland. Our projects address the urgent literacy crisis in disadvantaged communities, where 61% of children don't own a single book and 73% of children under 10 struggle to read a sentence. Our commitment to empowering disadvantaged children throughout Australia and overseas drives us to equip them with the vital literacy skills necessary to thrive in an evolving economy.

As we continue our efforts, our overarching goal remains to combat the literacy crisis by providing children and young people with essential tools, resources, and support. We believe that every child deserves an equal opportunity to excel academically and personally, regardless of their socioeconomic background.

ROOP

In 2024-25, we provided directly benefited 3,460 children with books and support. Engaged with 1,450 families in 560 early childhood activities for kindergarten or school. Provided 2,845 Literacy Starter Packs for children in 12 of Australia's most disadvantaged regions. Our goal is to improve literacy outcomes in the regions with the greatest need.

PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

SUN BOOKS

Sun Books, a low-cost digital library, provides access to 850 books in classrooms across Nigeria, Uganda, South Africa, and Kenya. In 2024-25, we reached 17,500 children with tutoring, +1,000 books, and literacy support.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2025

Note 1: Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Reform Act (Victoria) 2012. The committee members have determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with applicable Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial report is prepared on a cash basis and is based on historical costs and does not consider changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

a) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the assets, being the higher of value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of 3 months or less.

d) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present value when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated exclusive of the number of goods and services tax (GST)

e) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised exclusive of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the TAX OFFICE. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the assets and liabilities statement are shown inclusive of GST.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES:

The World Literacy Foundation in Australia is working in partnership with 45 groups and 3920 internationally across 25 countries with one common goal: to eradicate illiteracy in our lifetime.

In Australia, one in four children struggle with basic reading skills. Our local programs focus on bridging the literacy gap for Indigenous Australians and children from low-income, migrant, and marginalised communities. We provide free children's books and tutoring support to 10,000 children with limited reading skills.

We plan to see every Australian child reach their full potential through the power of learning and literacy.

By doing so, we aim to reduce poverty, improve health, increase employment and educational prospects, and see lives changed forever.
