I hope you all have had a good summer of displaying and fun with our hobbies. I am always looking for something different or something that no one else has. It is interesting to watch people at a tractor or engine show and what the spectator will look at. I found an old Shaw R-8 tractor probably made in the late 1940's that a man had manufactured a front loader on the little tractor. It is usually a hit everywhere I take it. Now let me tell you a little more about the tractor. Another man called me and said he heard that I collected Shaw tractors. I said yes and he told me about the little Shaw he had purchased and told me a little about what he had found. We agreed on a trade on some equipment I had and I was to do the hauling. I loaded my stuff and started down to his place with some scant direction. I got off the big road and started down in the hills of the Missouri Ozarks. The further I went the narrower and crooked the road got and I finally came into a little valley between two mountains. There was a big gate into his place and of course I was met by a big dog that was barking. You never know whether they will bite you or lick you to death. The man came out and called off the dog and he took me back behind a barn which was between two mountains and looked at the little "morphodite" Shaw. It was a pitifully looking thing. There is a factory tag on the frame that says it is a Shaw. He said this is the way he found it and he had it running a couple of years ago when he purchased it. The original builder that built the loader must have only had a stick to measure with, a torch and a stick welder, a pile of scrap metal and a great imagination. It was moss green in color because that was the color of the moss. The sun only hits the area between 10 and 2 because of the height of the two mountains. The engine had been swapped from an 8 HP to a 16 HP Briggs, a Williams piston pump had been installed on the side of the frame for the hydraulic power and then a front loader was cobbled together. The amazing thing about the little unit is that it works great. It has power both directions, hydraulic bucket in both directions, has a power lift on the back with a plow attached and another cylinder mounted underneath that we don't know what he had in mind for the next attachment. The rear tires have mud chains attached and the front tires

look to be the originals that came on the tractor when it was new. I put signs on the side of the unit telling what I know about the little tractor and loader. The people will walk by tractors that have a spit shine on them and drool over the little Shaw.

Now, the rest of the story. When I went to pick the tractor up after the local fair this year, there was a note attached to one of the signs. It said call me about your little tractor.

So that night I called the number and the man asked me what I knew about the tractor. I told him I would like to know who built the unit. He thinks that his granddad had bought the Shaw tractor new and later built the loader and he remembers playing on it as a kid. From all appearance of the loader his granddad used what ever he could from the scrap pile. There isn't any 2 pieced the same length. At least there isn't another one like it and everything works. In the builder's eyes it is a piece of art. This is Ozarks Ingenuity at its best.

Northwest Director and Insurance Update By Dick Tombrink

In July I attended the NW Regional EDGETA meeting/show at Brooks Oregon, hosted by branch 15. It was a great show, lot of activity, not only by branch 15 but other groups as well. In talking with the officers of branch 15, they asked about our EDGETA requirement of requiring swap meet vendors to be members of EDGETA. In my last insurance update, I mentioned that our insurance carrier will no longer allow us to sign up arts and craft and other flea market vendors as members of EDGETA so they have our insurance. We have discussed this further with our insurance carrier and they have decided that we can no longer sign up swap meet vendors either to have EDGETA insurance. Their comment is that they insure tractor and engine exhibitors, etc., but not vendors at the shows. At the Brooks show they had a flea market/swap meet. As I walked around looking at the vendors it was hard to determine if they were a flea market vendor or a swap meet vendor. Some were selling both flea market items as well as swap meet (tractor and engine parts) items.

The branch still has EDGETA insurance coverage in the event of an incident arising from one of the vendors, but the individual vendor is on his own for insurance coverage. If you have a food vendor at your show, note that it is a requirement that your branch get a certificate of insurance from the food vendor naming your EDGETA branch as an additional insured. Therefore we will be making the following changes on our website. The following is an additional Q&A that will be published soon on the website.

31. Can I sign up vendors that sell food, art and crafts, flea market articles, and swap meet vendors at our event as members of EDGETA to get insurance coverage for them?

No. EDGETA insurance no longer covers these vendors. We can no longer sign them up as members of a branch to get coverage for them. However, EDGETA insurance will cover the branch itself for an incident involving the vendors. But again our EDGETA insurance will no longer cover the vendors. Vendors should have their own insurance. Branches need to be more insistent to get a certificate of insurance from vendors, especially commercial vendors. This is also especially important and a requirement for food vendors. Please refer to [Vendor/Craftsperson Booth Application](#) on the EDGETA web site. In no case does the EDGE&TA insurance policy provide general liability coverage for the products sold/traded.

Under insurance summary on the EDGETA website, we will be making changes that reflect the above change as well.

Please visit our EDGETA web site often, www.edgeta.org. We are continually updating the whole website as things change. We try to keep the information on the website updated, but sometimes it takes time to sort it all out. If you have any questions they probably are addressed there. 
