Little known facts that tie Allis Chalmers to Fort Scott, KS.

Bill Roberts, Missouri born in 1898 and farm bred. Bill went to work for Allis Chalmers in 1924 fresh from the Springfield, Missouri Business College. In 1931 he became sales manager of the Allis Chalmers tractor division. In 1941 he had moved up to General Manager of the tractor division. On Feb 26, 1951 he became president of Allis Chalmers. Mr. Roberts died in 1955 of a heart attack. His body was transported to Fort Scott, KS for burial in the family plot.

Branch 17 is a guest of the Pioneer Harvest Fiesta and most have dual memberships.

Both clubs are in the rebuilding stage.

Branch 17 President Gary Dowling called the meeting to order at 5:00 PM Saturday afternoon.
