You build a racer out of a valve cover. There are certain rules to building a racer but your imagination is the limit. I had a great time at their show. They host this show each year, so if you are in the area during this time of the year, you owe it to yourself to stop by.

We are always looking for ideas to improve our website. If you have suggestions, please contact one of the directors. I received a letter from a member concerning a show guide we had posted on the website in the past. The board has posted that show guide back to the website, and we are currently working to update it. We are putting together a simple page of reference points to help branches when working on a show. This is one of many suggestions the board has used to improve the information made available for the membership. Again, if you have suggestions let us know.

Please share this information with all members. The board of directors are members of the association. We are elected by a vote of the membership. Each director serves a term of 3 years. The directors come from the region they live in with the exception of the director-at-large who may live in any of the regions. The director's terms are posted on the website administration page under each director's photo. This is a membership run association. Please look for the information in the newsletters and on the web site to see when the director position in your

respective regions will be up for re-election. I encourage all those interested to get involved. It takes all of us to keep our association strong. If you are interested in possibly serving as a director please, contact your regional director or any director and talk to them about serving. There are a lot of good ideas out there, and we would like to hear them.

Please remember to include your branch number when corresponding to the national secretary or any of the directors. If you are completing any forms for EDGE&TA, you must include you branch number on those as well. The branch number issued when your club joined EDGE&TA is how your branch agreed to be identified during the application process. This speeds up any process concerning your branch.

It would be a good idea for each branch to have someone to visit the web site on a regular basis. The web site is the easiest and fastest way we have to reach all the members. There are web pages set up for each branch. These pages can be used to post pictures, show schedules your branch will attend during the year and general information about your branch. You can include things like history of the club and specific items the club collects. If your club does a good bit of charity work, you can tell all about that too. You may even inspire other clubs to do the same thing or give them an idea of their own. The web pages are a great way for the clubs to learn about each other, too. As small as the world seems to be at times, some folks don't get to travel around the United States and having the ability to see clubs from other states or even in their own states through the use of a branches web page can be a treat. You know they say, "A picture is worth a thousand words." There are many members who would be glad to share the knowledge they have with others. The web pages may also help contact with someone with a rare part needed to complete a project. It may also be a way to get more exposure for your branch to get young folks interested in the hobby.

I would like to end this on a note about safety. The safety requirements listed on the website are put

together by members who understand how the equipment we exhibit works. They understand how quick an accident could happen. It only takes a few minutes to make the show or exhibit safe for everyone. I was working on a closet this evening, and I kept thinking "measure twice cut once." Safety is a lot like that. Look twice to prevent an accident. Take that one extra step to ensure the equipment and exhibit is safe working order and also that the spectators are protected from hurting themselves from over curiosity.

I look forward to seeing you out at the shows during the show season. I hope everyone has a safe summer.

Insurance Update, June 27, 2017, By Dick Tombrink, NW Regional Director

Sue and I just returned home from the EDGETA National Meeting and Show in Fruitport, Michigan and from the NW Regional show in Filer, Idaho. Both were great shows. Fruitport had a good variety of tractors on display. There were also stationary engines, although predominately more tractors.

The NW Regional show in Filer, Idaho was primarily stationary engines. There were over a 100 engines present, and most of them were the rare and unusual engines. Most I had not seen before. It was a great display.

There are several things that I need to emphasize regarding our safety rules. Don't forget to have a fire extinguisher prominently displayed on each tractor that is in a tractor drive or tractor parade. Exhibits with running engines are required to have easy access to a working fire extinguisher located away from stored fuel containers.

At the National and Regional we talked about the need for branches to send in their membership prior to March 15th each year. We realize there will be members that will pay their dues later, but we encourage getting as many as you can by that date. If your branch does not send in your membership by April 15th, you are reminded that your branch does not have insurance coverage. Our new insurance year starts on April 15th, and only those that have sent in their membership will be covered. We are

also advising our insurance carrier of those branches who have not submitted their membership by about April 1st. Any certificate of insurance requests will not be sent out until the branch dues are received by Carrie Jo.

We used to have a show guide on our website for those branches that will be hosting the National and Regional meetings. For some reason it got deleted from the website, but it has been resurrected and is now back on the website.

At the NW Regional meeting, I had a question from one of the branches asking if our insurance would cover a hand cranked corn-shucker with spectator kids turning the crank. It would be located within a roped off area with the crank accessible from the outside of the ropes. I checked with our insurance carrier, and he said it would be covered. But he stated it must be done with a branch member closely monitoring and supervising the operation to prevent the child from any injury. He stated the kids are unpredictable, and you need be sure you tell them how to operate the crank to prevent any insurance incident. If you leave your roped off exhibit, be sure to disable or move the corn-shucker so that it is not accessible by kids.

This is one way for branches to get kids interested and involved in our branches. I feel these kinds of activities will go a long way to continue the branch membership in the future. If you find a kid interested in antique engines, or tractors, or other branch activities, please encourage them and work with them to develop that interest. They will be the future members and leaders of our great hobby. If the kids are happy at the show and want to stay longer, their mothers are probably going to stay longer too, and the Dads benefit because they can also stay longer and enjoy the show.

Summer is here. Temperatures have reached 110° in my area. Tourists from all over the world head for Death Valley to experience high temperatures which recently reached 131°. The first day that I worked there years ago, I enjoyed the cool of my air conditioning from Bishop, CA to Death Valley. Upon my arrival the superintendent informed me that it was 126°, and assured me that it would cool to 100° at night for a comfortable sleep. Not exactly what I had in mind. Due to the abundance of rain here in California this past season there is plenty of dried vegetation now. In certain areas the State employs the use of goats to eat the vegetation to help control the dangers of wildfires. At the present time there are a number of wildfires across the State. From Buster Brown, Director-at-Large



Changes for selection of National EDGETA Shows

Prior to 2017, the country consisted of 2 divisions for selection of Branches to host a National: divisions: 1. NW/SW

2. All remaining Branches EAST of Division 1

Effective in 2017, the country now consists of 3 divisions for National Show locations:

1. NE/SE
2. NC/SC
3. NW/SW

By dividing the country into 3 divisions versus 2 gives east and central Branches more opportunity to host an EDGETA National Show. The timeline for hosting a National is:

2017 NE/SE
2018 NC/SC
2019 -NW/SW
2020 NE/SE – etc.

Also, effective in 2017, there will be NO Regional Show in region hosting a National. (i.e., the 2017 National was in the NE so there was no Regional in the NE.)

A question often asked at National and Regional meetings is how a Branch is selected to host a National and or Regional Show.

There are 2 lists for me to select each type of show: a National list and Regional list. Both Shows are selected by the NEXT Branch Number within the division or region. If a Branch declines, the next number is asked if they would like to host a show.
