Insurance Update, July 2019, By Dick Tombrink, NW Regional Director

Spring is almost gone and Summer starts tomorrow. We had our branch tractor drive last Saturday, followed by a taco dinner. Everyone had a great time, and all the tractors made it through without breaking down. We also attended the EDGETA National Meeting and Show in Red Bluff, CA in May. They had a great show, lots of tractors and interesting engine and machinery exhibits. This is a busy time of the year, with most of the shows going on. I encourage everyone to take the time to be safe so everyone goes home happy at the end of the day.

Our improved insurance coverage took effect on April 15, which now includes participant liability coverage. As you know our insurance cost per member was increased to cover it. The rollout went pretty smooth. The participant liability coverage fills a void that we had in our previous insurance coverage.

The Frequently Asked Questions section of our EDGETA website has been updated to reflect our additional coverage. If you have not reviewed it recently, I suggest you review it now. We have also reviewed each question and brought it up to date, including a date each question was reviewed or revised. There have been other changes in the website in an effort to spice it up. There have been some personnel changes, several directors retired, and new directors have taken their place. See the administration page of the EDGETA website.

One question that keeps coming up is about using your EDGETA Branch number or your "Also Known As" Club name when dealing with a public entity. Our insurance agent has contacted our insurance carrier and discussed the situation with them. You need to use the "EDGETA Branch number" in all your outside correspondence including rental contracts, show posters, show flyers, etc. If a lawsuit names both the EDGETA Branch and it's "Also Known As" Club name, the policy will respond only for the EDGETA activities. The "Also Known As" Club names are listed on our website under branch locations. It is important for each branch to keep their branch number and branch "Also Known As" Club names up to date on the EDGETA website.

The EDGETA NW Regional meeting and show will be hosted by Branch 245 in Shelton, WA, on July 12-14th. For more information go to <u>www.exhaustfumes.org</u>. We will be there, and are looking forward to seeing you there if you can attend.



Practice "Safety First"

Hello to all, and welcome from Middle Tennessee! I would like to introduce myself as a new director for EDGETA. I have two steam engines that my family and I actively show around the mid- south area. One is a half-scale that my grandfather built, and the other is a 1921 model that is keeping me busy in the shop getting ready for summer show season. We have taken our engines to Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and all over Tennessee as well as Illinois, Ohio, and Indiana. We enjoy getting out on the road and meeting new people and going to new shows. We haven't been able to get to as many shows in the last two years as we might have due to a run in with cancer, but that is all fixed up and the doctors are happy now, so we are back and hoping to see many of you at a show soon.

I am also a founding member of Branch 202 here in Tennessee, the Tennessee Historic Steam and Gas Association. We will be hosting the SE Regional Show this October in Portland, TN and the National show next September in Eagleville, TN.

One of the biggest struggles I see in our hobby is how to engage the younger generations. Let's face the facts; many of us either grew up on a farm or had relatives that farmed that sparked our interest in the old equipment. One of my grandfathers farmed as well as my father-in-law. But we are seeing less and less people involved in farming. If we don't develop a plan to try and spark interest, there is no natural connection that will keep the kids interested in our hobby. We need to work on ways that encourage future owners of these tractors, steam engines, hit and miss engines, etc. to restore, parade, and display them or there will be a slow and certain end to the shows and the hobby we enjoy so much.

One idea I have had is to recruit, train and then give certain youths equipment. Let's say you have a member of your club who has no heirs and wants to make sure his equipment is placed in good hands. You, as a club, encourage them to donate the equipment or even just pieces of it; then you place it in the care of a younger member. One person had heard of such an arrangement where the parent and child had to agree to keep the equipment up to the best of their abilities and show it for three years.

I'm not recommending to give an 8-year old a 30-60 Aultman Taylor; rather you could give a youth, displaying appropriate interest and maturity, a Maytag or an old Cub Cadet and make a regular practice of doing that so that it could possibly attract some interest and a new generation of enthusiasts.

These young members could be there to host the shows and preserve and display this old equipment we love so much for years to come. Again, this are just my thoughts on the idea; there are many different ways we could identify and recruit younger members to our hobby.

We had a bit of bad luck at our shop about two

months ago. One of our employees was towing a customer's tractor and wrecked. He rolled the truck three or four times, destroying the truck, trailer and tractor in the process. Thankfully, he walked away with only a few minor scratches. It's given us time to review what worked and what did not. Wearing his seat belt certainly saved his life in this instance. Also, I am not a fan at all of strapping heavy items; when you do the math, chains give you a better margin of safety. I read somewhere that in times of stress the weight of the item being secured can triple, so for a 3,000-pound tractor, you need to plan for securement of 9,000 pounds. Our chains held and the tractor was still on the trailer when the wreck ended. One of the disappointments was the trailer coupler failing. The truck was not hooked to the trailer when all the items came to rest. In fact, the trailer was left in the median pointing straight up. It was a new coupler, and I would have never have guessed it would have failed. The root cause of the accident was the trailer started whipping, and the driver could not control it. Whether it was excessive speed or improper weight distribution, this is a regular problem when towing and a cause of many accidents. A more experienced driver might have noticed the symptoms faster and reloaded the tractor. But this is a story where experience can be a great teacher. I am sharing all this in the hopes that others can possibly learn from this driver's mistake. We are all thankful he was ok and the insurance covered the equipment. It can be a bit harder when you are towing a 100-year old piece of equipment.

Be safe on the way to shows this year and I hope to see you there.
