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### Insurance Update, June 2020, By Dick Tombrink, NW Regional Director

Lots of changes have happened since the last newsletter. I don't think any of us expected the Covid 19 pandemic to affect us as much as it has. A great majority of the tractor and engine shows have been cancelled or postponed to a later date. We had our Branch meeting last Thursday and voted to cancel our show for this year, hoping that we will be able to have it in August 2021. These are situations that we have not seen in the past, and we don't know how to deal with it.

The question was asked to our EDGETA insurance agent of what coverage we have in view of the pandemic. We have the basically the same coverage we had last year. But industry wide, there will probably be some situations that will have to be decided in lawsuits. Their recommendation was for us to adhere to all the safety regulations that government officials and health organizations are publishing to keep everyone safe and healthy.

For our branch, we looked at our local health requirements and State Regulations and applied them to our show. There was no way we could expect spectators and our members to adhere to the 6-foot spacing requirements, sanitize the kids barrel train after the kids get out, sanitize the people mover, sanitize the porta potties, limit the number of people on the show grounds, etc. Not only would we be jeopardizing the health of the spectators but also the members of our branch. We do not have enough branch members to cover all the health requirements as well as put on the show.

I covered this item in my last newsletter but will include this reminder again. Be sure to update your branch directors and officers list on the EDGETA website if you have not already done so. Updating your D&O list is easy to do. The list is on line on the EDGETA website for each branch. Check your branch number on your EDGETA branch location website and be sure it shows that your branch list is updated for 2020. If not please update it at your earliest convenience.

Since we are not having shows this summer, it is a good time to get to that project that is waiting in your shop. I have several that I am working on, plus enough others to keep me busy. If not, my wife will come up with more.
