We are hearing from members that are having to make a choice of which shows to go to as they can't afford fuel for all the shows.

We just went to the South West Regional Show in Gardnerville, NV. There were exhibitors from five different states there. There were 70 tractors and over 30 engines on display. Branch 132 did a great job hosting this show. Ron Hanson, the SW Regional Director, was there and exhibited with us. We were honored to present the trophies to all the winning tractor pullers after the Saturday night dinner and meeting.

Now we are looking forward to the National Show which will be held in Republic, Missouri September 15th-18th this year. Branch 16 will be hosting this show. Hopefully, many of you will be able to go to this one as we have heard that they put on a great show every year.

As of this date, we have 5,200 members and more are coming in every week. We are down to 137 branches. There are a few that have not sent in membership this year and have also not updated their webpage with current officers. There are 42 branches that have NOT updated their officers this year. Some have not updated since 2019 and when I try to call them, the phone numbers are out of service and addresses are not current. Carrie Jo gets newsletters and correspondence returned. Please check your branch webpage and make sure the officers are current and that all the information is correct. We need to be able to contact you.

Also, our insurance agent is getting more requests for Additionally Insured Certificates this year. You should make this request at least 30 days ahead of your event. Also, Please make sure that all information is correct on the form you

submit to the insurance company. This form is found on our EDGE&TA website on the forms page. We have had several Certificate requests with incorrect information. Then the landowner (fairgrounds, city, whoever is requesting the Certificate) rejects it and asks for another one with the correct information. So, <u>Please</u>, double check the form to make sure you have the correct phone numbers, emails, addresses and dates before you submit the form. Putting the wrong information down will result in a delay and possibly you not receiving the Certificate in time for your event.

We are still looking for a North Central Director. If you live in Missouri, Kansas, Wisconsin, Michigan, or Illinois and would like to have input into the National business, please call me for more information. My information is in this newsletter and on the website.

Just be sure and follow all the safety rules at every show. It is mandatory to have a safety meeting the first morning of each show to remind everyone of the rules and ask if anyone has any questions or concerns. This meeting should be conducted by the President of the branch or the Safety Officer. If you have any questions or comments, please contact either your Director or me and we will discuss them.

Go out there and have fun. We need to enjoy our hobby and teach others about how farm life was before all this technology. We always need new blood in our club. Do your best to recruit new members.


We are looking forward to our trip to attend the National EDGETA Show in Republic, MO in September. Hopefully, we will see some of you there.
