**3 low bids
for sewage
plant work**

Three low bids totaling \$15,848,000 for the expansion of the Hamilton Township sewage treatment plant were received yesterday.

The bids for the project, which is three-quarters federally funded, must now be reviewed by Betz Engineering consultants of Philadelphia and the U.S. Department of Environmental Protection.

Low bid for the general contracting job was submitted by Titant Group Inc. of Paramus, for \$14.3 million; the heating, ventilating, and air conditioning low bid came from United Catalysts of Cinnaminson, \$563,000; and the electrical bid was from Zoe Electric Corp. of Leonia, \$985,000.

The only bid on the whole project was submitted by three firms in a joint venture for \$19.9 million. The firms are Frank Briscoe Co. of East Orange, Courtier & Co. of New York City and Conduit and Foundations Inc. of Clifton.

There were 30 separate bids. Some 183 subcontractors and equipment manufacturers picked up plans and specifications, according to Purchasing Supervisor John Ricci.

**Theft of wire
sets back plan
to light field**

A bandit reportedly stole some 3,000 feet of underground electrical wire from the soccer field at Nottingham Junior High School.

"It's discouraging and frustrating," Hamilton Mayor John Rafferty lamented, noting the increased enthusiasm for soccer in the township had encouraged officials to install lighting at the junior high field.

Hamilton is now sponsoring some 75 games a week for 2,000 young soccer players in the township, and while there are several lighted baseball diamonds in the township there are no soccer fields with lights.

Police are not convinced the wire robber is a vandal because last week's theft was "clean," with no other destruction evident. Rafferty said the wiring would be replaced at a cost of about \$1,000. He said the police would keep a closer eye on the field.

**Colonial soldiers
to do battle during
2-day encampment**

The Hopewell Valley Bicentennial Commission will hold a two-day 18th century military encampment at Washington Crossing State Park Oct. 23 and 24.

The event is being staged to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Johnson's Ferry House, a reconstructed revolutionary inn near the park, and to celebrate Veteran's Day.

The activities, scheduled to begin each day at 10 a.m., include two mock pitched battles between the Revolutionary War Units participating in the encampment. All the activities will take place at Sullivan's Grove in the park.

The 200 participants include: Billop's Core soldiers from Staten Island, N.Y.; Hamilton's Artillery, Long Island, N.Y.; Lamb's Artillery, Mendham; Von Mierback's Regiment of Hessians, Pennsylvania; Egg Harbor Guard, Egg Harbor and Morgan's Rifles, Morristown.

The event is co-sponsored by the Washington Crossing Association of New Jersey. More than 2,000 people are expected to attend.

**Hopewell gets
new borough
police number**

HOPEWELL — A new telephone number for borough police will go into use Oct. 1.

The new number — 737-2440 — links the borough with a three-municipality communications system that includes Hopewell Township and borough and Pennington Borough.
