


PHILADELPHIA, May 16 (P).-Owen D. Young says American insistence on the "letter of the bond" in the war debts problem resulted in paralysis of world trade.

of America, Young, prominent industrialist, said last night:

"We insisted that our allies sign
the bond to return money which we
had advanced—no, not money even,
but goods which we had contributed

o a common cause.
"We asked them to sign the bond "We asked them to sign the bond. They could only repay that debt by sending us their goods. To the extent that we would not accept sufficiently of their goods, they could only pay by sending us their gold. So, having refused their goods, we took their gold until we ruined the currency and banking systems of the world, including our own."
