GAMING HALL HERE LIKE MONTE CARLO

Saloon licenses before prohibition cost an even \$400 each. There are 3.060 speakeasies that the police know of in Trenton. Multiply \$400 by 3.060, and the resultant \$1,224,000 represents what the blind tiger trainers save in license fees alone. What price hush money, then, and who gets it?

Why it is that Pat and Angel, Meyer and Abe, Harry and Louis, and the rest of the big operators, carry on unmolested? Who does Mickey pay for the privilege of running his two big gambling enterprises on North and South Warren Streets?

Warren Streets?

The Trenton Police Department will this year cost Trenton taxpayers more than half a million dollars. According to the 1928 budget, the cost will be \$586,691.51. This is \$12.846.68 more than the budget expenditure of 1927, when the appropriation for the police department was \$573.844.83.

By far the greatest fitem in the police department's cost is that for salarles. The 1928 budget fixes that amount at \$523,194.47. This item includes salaries of all the department members from and including the chief of police to the humblest employe.
