My dear Mr. Wilber:

Reply to your letter of April 20th has been delayed by the pressure of work in connection with the Golden Gate bridge.

I appreciate very much the information regarding the Washington Crossing Memorial bridge and also appreciate your kind offer to keep me in mind as soon as anything materializes that can be considered definite action. Having served the Federal government on many occasions and in the last instance, in connection with the Arlington Memorial Bridge, I feel that the suggestion of my services in connection with this proposed bridge would not be unfavorably received.

I agree fully with your emphatic view that something in the way of asuggestive design would be of real help for propaganda purposes and I would be glad, as soon as I have the Golden Gate bridge under way, to cooperate with you in a study leading to such a suggestive design and would be glad to do this without any financial obligation on your part. If you could send me the plan and profile at the proposed point of crossing and such other data respecting the width of the bridge contemplated, approaches, etc., it might be helpful in making such a study. The problem would interest me very much indeed and I would be glad to undertake its solution along original lines as outlined in my previous letter.

Bids on the Golden Gate bridge will be received on June 17th and at that time - or shortly thereafter - if you desire, I can send you a copy of our revised General Drawing of the final design as well as the studies of the more important architectural features, such as the towers and anchorages, providing you are interested in receiving them.

I appreciate the courtesy of your reply very much and look forward to the opportunity of meeting you some time when I am again in the East. In the meantime, I remain,
