

Mary Jenkins Dies; Ardent Abolitionist

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 9.—Mrs. Mary Anna Jenkins, widow of Howard M. Jenkins, author and historian, and an active worker for the cause of slavery abolition in her youth, died Saturday at her home, Avalon, in Gwynedd. She was 96.

A member of the Society of Friends, Mrs. Jenkins was deeply concerned by the plight of Negroes who escaped from Southern slave owners and made their way North. Her home in Cherry Lane, Upper Dublin Township, became an "underground railway" for the fugitives.

Mrs. Jenkins was born in Warwick Township, Bucks County, Pa., the daughter of Thomas and Hannah Jenkins. She was married March 15, 1865, and with her husband settled in Norristown, where he owned and edited the Norristown Republican.

She was the mother of seven children, one of whom died in infancy.

Rufus C. Dawes Dies; Chicago Fair's Head

CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—Rufus C. Dawes, who guided the Chicago World's Fair through successful seasons in 1933 and 1934 and proudly wrote its financial history in black ink, died yesterday.

His death, at the age of 72, was attributed to a heart attack. While he was widely known as a utilities executive, civic leader and member of a family famed in business, banking and politics, he attracted most attention as president of a Century of Progress exposition, the big show which drew nearly 40,000,000 persons to the lake front grounds while the city and nation were emerging from the depression.

Brief Sickness Is Fatal at 43

William Goyne Blackman Had Busy Career In War and Civics

Following a two weeks' illness, William Goyne Blackman, one of the junior executives of the Unemployment Compensation Commission, died today at Mercer Hospital. He was 43 years old.

He became ill at Christmas time and was removed to the hospital two days ago. A cerebral hemorrhage was given as the cause of death. Born in Trenton, Mr. Blackman graduated from the Trenton High School and Rutgers University.

During the World War, he enlisted in the Air Service, receiving his training at the Cornell University Ground Training School. He then was transferred to Camp Dick, Dallas, Texas, for further training and was later stationed at Call Field, Wichita Falls, Texas. Some time later he was attached to a Machine Gun Unit at Camp Meade.

After the Armistice, Mr. Blackman spent three years working in the Texas oil fields as an engineer. He returned to Trenton in 1923 and for the next nine years was employed in the City Engineer's office. From 1933 to 1937, he was again in Texas, employed by the Texas Company in its oil refining division. For the past two years, he has been affiliated with the Unemployment Compensation Commission's headquarters office.

An active member of Trenton Post No. 93, American Legion, and Trenton Lodge No. 105, B. P. O. E., Mr. Blackman suggested the plan which resulted in a project for marking World War veterans' graves, operated in conjunction with the American Legion throughout the State. As a city engineer, he supervised the survey of the Water Power, which led to its ultimate acquisition by the city.

The son of Mrs. Lillian A. and the late William R. Blackman, the dead man resided at 982 Lambertson Street with his mother, his only survivor. His grandparents, the late William E. and Sarah Blackman and the late Police Captain William and Patience Hartmann, were well known residents of the South Trenton section.

Funeral arrangements are being completed under direction of John A. Hartmann, who will be announced later.

DeWayne Pullen Carr, retired Pennsylvania engineer, died yesterday afternoon at his home in East Orange, N. J., after a five-months illness. J. C. W. Beckham Dies; Ex-Kentucky Governor

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 9.—J. C. W. Beckham, former Democratic Governor of Kentucky and United States Senator, died today. He was 71.

Beckham, then Lieutenant Governor, became Governor in 1900 after the assassination of William Goebel.

The veteran politician and lawyer, ill since a stroke of paralysis last August, was a leading figure in Kentucky political history nearly a half century, beginning with his election over his own protests as a State representative when he was 24.

He was elected to the United States Senate in 1914 and served one term.

In recent years he tried in vain to win again the nomination for both the Governorship and the Senate.
