

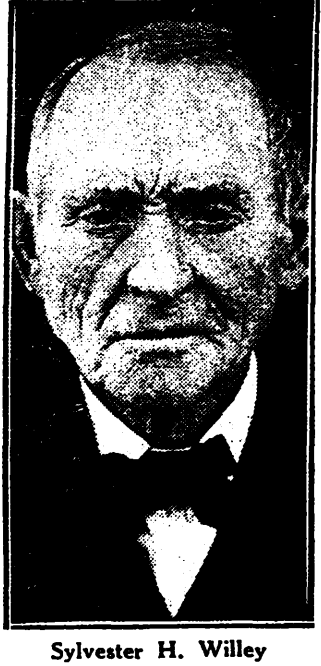
### Fatally Stricken By Heart Attack

Prominent White Horse  
Resident Was 83  
Years Old

Sylvester H. Willey, one of the oldest and best known residents of White Horse, died suddenly yesterday at his home, Hobson and Olympia Avenues, following a heart attack. Mr. Willey was in his 84th year. He is survived by a son, Charles Willey, of Florence, N. J.; two sisters, Sarah Willey and Mrs. George E. Stout, of this city, and five grandchildren. Funeral arrangements are being completed under direction of Ivins & Taylor, Inc. For twenty years, Mr. Willey was the superintendent of Colonial Cemetery. He has been an active member of the Pearsonville M. E. Church for many years and is a steward and member of the official board of that church. He was born in Dover, Del., and comes of a long line of ministers. Two of his brothers were ministers, as was his father. The funeral services for Mr. Willey will be held from the home of his nephew, Howard S. Willey, 2946 South Broad Street, on Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Services will be conducted by the Rev. JERSEY CITY, Oct. 3.—Mrs. Wilhelmina Worms, mother of Captain William F. Worms, first officer of the ill-fated ship *Morro Castle*, died on Saturday in Jersey City, a few hours after suffering a paralytic stroke. Her age was 76. Funeral services will be held tonight. Members of the family said Mrs. Worms worried herself into a highly nervous state over the ship disaster. Mrs. Worms was born in New York on April 20, 1858. Her parents moved to Jersey City when she was 13 years old, and she had since resided there. She is survived by her husband, Ferdinand Worms, a marine artist; two daughters, Miss Edith J. Worms and Mrs. Dorothy A. McBride; Captain Warm (who spells his name differently from that of his parents), and four grandchildren, Harry F. McBride and Donald, Robert W. and William F. Worms, Jr.

### Calvin W. Rice Dies; Famous As Engineer

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Calvin Winsor Rice, 66, of Montclair, N. J., secretary of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers for 28 years, died last night in Murray Hill Hospital. He was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage in his office yesterday. Rice was born in Winchester, Mass., and was a member of engineering societies in England, Germany, Holland, Argentina, Brazil and Chile. He held the Knight Cross Order of the White Lion from Czechoslovakia. At Cologne in 1931 he was awarded the Medal of Honor from Verein Deutscher Ingenieure on the 50th anniversary of the society "in appreciation of services to technical and scientific achievement, particularly in promoting mutual international interests of engineers of the entire world."

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### Troops in Georgia Reach Strike Area

ROME, Ga., Oct. 3 (AP).—Georgia's National Guard, fresh from action in textile strike regions, moved into Rome today to dominate an area where civil authorities reported a strike of 600 score foundry workers. Led by Adjutant General Lindley W. Camp, the Guardsmen arrived at dawn to establish protectorates over four foundries affected by the strike. Governor Eugene Talmage ordered the troops into the zone after Sheriff O. L. Betts and Circuit Judge James Maddox advised him the striking moulders and mounters had halted the foundries' efforts to load freight cars.

### Sent to Jail Here For Obscene Notes

Five obscene letters received by a Flemington woman resulted today in the arrest of Michael Griffin, of that place, and his commitment to the Mercer County Jail in default of bail. According to Federal Court records, Griffin, a man in his 60's, was convicted of a like offense last February 2. The maximum penalty is five years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. Mrs. Charlotte Maue is the woman to whom the letters were addressed. Their contents are described as "obscene" in the complaint on which United States Commissioner Marvin A. Spaulding set bail at \$2,000. In default, Griffin was committed. The first letter received by Mrs. Maue was put in the mails on April 20, it is alleged. Others followed on May 3, June 8 and August 17, with Mrs. Maue deciding she would tolerate it no longer when another came on October 2. Postal Inspector V. F. Sands was notified and the arrest followed.

### Rickenbacker Protests Politics in Aviation

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP).—Eddie Rickenbacker, war ace and vice president of North American Aviation, recommended today creation of a "non-political" agency to take over the regulation of all civil aviation and determine award of air field contracts. He told the President's Aviation Commission there should be an agency "similar to the I. C. C. which would not permit political influence to destroy aviation to the extent that it has to date."
