Nation-wide Fraud Feared As Fake Stocks Are Found in Chicago

FORGED SHARES BELIEVED SOLD IN MANY CITIES

Counterfeit Fox Film Certificates Discovered in Trade on Bourse

(United Press)
CHICAGO, Dec. 27. — A stock swindle in which thousands of forged certificates of Fox Film and other large corporations have been sold to brokers and investors was revealed today after \$89,000 worth of the fake certificates were discovered in Chicago.

Stock Exchange officials and brokerage firms in Chicago, New York and other large cities were reported to have been notified of the scheme and a nationwide checkup was started to determine the authenticity of all stocks in circulation.

Chicago brokers admitted that the swindle might have extended over the nation. Stocks of at least two corpora-tions in addition to Fox Film were said to have been counterfeited.

Arthur Wood, president of the Chi-cago Stock Exchange, admitted that spurious stocks of three firms had been discovered, but he refused to reveal their identity. Neither would he di-vulge the amount of money repre-sented in all of the counterfeit stocks

sented in all of the counterfeit stocks found in circulation.

Details of the plot were said to have been revealed with the arrest of Louis Liss, of Chicago, who assertedly sold \$25,000 worth of the counterfeit stocks to Stein, Alstrin & Co., a brokerage firm, several days ago.

The forged certificates were said to be of such clever workmanship that even experienced brokers would be unable to detect them without careful scrutiny.


