ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP)—The newly crowned Miss New Jersey had a weighty problem today. Sally Joan Waller of West Orange, named fairest flower in the Garden State Saturday night, wants to lose a few pounds here and there. The pretty, blue-eyed brunette, whose 5-9 3/4 frame supports a 36-25-36 1/2 form, said a diet is first on her agenda.

She weighs 136 pounds now, she said, but would like to be a shade more streamlined by the time Sept. 6 and the Miss America beauty pageant roll around. Miss Waller, the tallest of the 15 aspirants for the state crown, was surprised when her name was announced as the winner. "I had no idea I would win," she said. "I was breathless. . . flabbergasted."

A rendition of "Singing in the Rain" while clad in a transparent raincoat over a dancing costume, and a soft shoe routine, helped put her over. She plans to use the first prize of a \$500 scholarship to continue her music studies at Oberlin, Ohio, College, where she is a sophomore.

The new Miss New Jersey said she would eventually like to get into musical comedy, "but getting my college degree is most important." There's no one man in her life at the moment. The 19-year-old beauty is neither engaged nor going steady. Second and third in the competition were Catherine Patricia Grand-Jean of Nixon and Shirley Jane Price of Millville, respectively. Dorothy Marie Dudek, Miss Paterson, was voted most talented.

Lance Assails Death Penalty In Sex Cases

NEWARK—AP—State Senator Westley L. Lance (R-Hunterdon) thinks "permissive death sentences" for sex molesters of children under 16 would lead to acquittals instead of convictions. Lance last night made known his opinion of a proposal by State Senator James Murray (D-Hudson) that juries be permitted to acquit instead of convicting an offender if the panel felt a conviction could send the defendant to the electric chair.

"This you would be defeating your objective," Lance told Murray on the weekly television program, "Legislative Report." "And instead of conviction and reasonable punishment," Lance added, "you would be getting acquittals with all the serious implications this state of things would have for the community." Murray said he plans to embody his proposal in a bill for introduction in the Senate this Fall. He also plans to introduce a resolution today calling for the establishment of a nine-member commission to study and strengthen on the state's sex laws.

Lance said he would vote for the resolution, which requires the commission to report back to the legislature and the Governor within six months with possible new laws and recommendations. Lawrence Whipple, director of public safety in Jersey City, Murray's home town, said he might "go along with the permissive death sentence" but he would be opposed to any mandatory death sentence.

Bill Would Aid State Farmers Hit By Drought

Federal legislation, which will bring some aid to New Jersey's drought-harassed farmers, has been passed by Congress and awaits President Eisenhower's signature. Congressman Charles R. Howell of the Mercer-Burlington district, drew public attention to this measure today. It is an amendment of the 1937 law giving loan privileges to farmers of the "arid and semiarid areas" of the West. Since drought conditions have become economically disastrous in this area, Howell has been among the Congressmen supporting extension of the law to Eastern states.

While appropriations for loans may not be large, Howell said they would help farmers get irrigation equipment and build dams and reservoirs to store water for emergency use. The New Jersey Congressman said he was confident State and local authorities would cooperate with the Federal Soil Conservation Service in making the law effective. The measure, he said, was only "a partial contribution to New Jersey's serious water shortage, but we must undertake every practical measure which promises some relief."

He said further legislation should be enacted to bring more water supplies to cities and other urban areas of the State.

Fearon, 21, of 2453 Pennington Road, received a possible fracture of the left shoulder and many cuts and bruises. Fearon is an iron worker employed by the American Bridge Company.
