

Golf Special To Be Shown From Hawaii

NEW YORK (AP) — When the telecast of the Hawaiian Open Golf Tournament in Honolulu this coming weekend reaches the mainland, it will have traveled through space and under the ocean.

The video picture from Waialae Country Club will be beamed by satellite to the West Coast and the audio will be sent by undersea cable.

Since the video portion has to travel nearly 50,000 miles through space and the audio only 2,000, the sound will reach the NBC studios at Burbank Calif., one-tenth of a second ahead of the picture. A special machine will slow down the sound so that it synchronizes with the picture.

NBC will show the \$100,000 tournament at 6:30-7:30 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 4 and at 6-7:30 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 5.

Weather Helps Boaters Get Ready For Winter

If today's weather matches that of last Sunday, we can't think of a better way to close the boating season than to make the most of it. All of the skippers we talked to last Sunday agreed that it was a day truly more rare than a day in June.

A comfortable thermometer reading, clear skies and smooth waters... the perfect combination... was augmented by a random pattern Scotch plaid pigmentation of the foliage along the water's edge. And, in the late afternoon, the wildfowl on the move settled to the water for a night's break in the trip south.

The wildfowl were not alone in migrating last Sunday. Hundreds of boats could be seen heading north on the Delaware River, on their way to be placed in winter storage. Other boats, many of substantial size, were to be observed heading toward the Chesapeake Bay, through the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal, on their way to Florida's waters.

A significant sign of the end of the present boating season can be seen today at the Bordentown Yacht Club, where members are assembled for the annual ritual of disconnecting the water and electrical lines on their nearly one-quarter mile long float.

Next weekend these same club members will exercise long unused muscles as they disconnect the individual floats and store them ashore.

Time For Talk, Work
All of this activity leads up to one of the favorite times of the year for many skippers... the opportunity to assemble at the boatyard, do a little work on the boat, and exchange experiences that took place during the past season.

If you were present when some of the experiences being discussed actually happened, chances are you wouldn't recognize them with the embellishments that have resulted from frequent retelling.

Perhaps, while we are discussing working on boats, now is as good a time as any to alert owners of fiber-glass boats to a danger they might run into in making repairs. Fiber-glass repairs are made with either of two groups of materials. One is the polyester group which consists of polyester resin, a promoter and a catalyst. The other is the epoxy group consisting of epoxy resin and a catalyst.

Caution must be exercised to see that a polyester catalyst and an epoxy catalyst are

never mixed together. A combination of the two can produce highly reactive results. Polyester materials and epoxy materials are not interchangeable. If you possess these two groups of fiber-glass repair materials, label them plainly and store them separately.

The end of an active on-the-water boating season makes way for an equally active social season for the area's skippers.

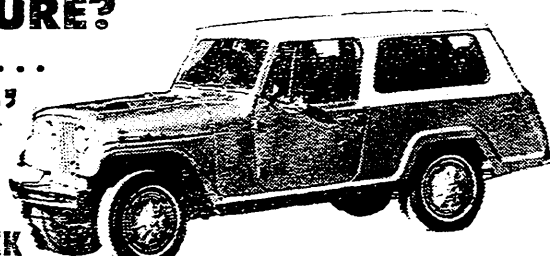
