Kentucky Derby Won By Dust Commander

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Dust Commander, purchased two years ago as "a cheap yearling to go with our expensive ones," turned hero yesterday when he awarded his owner the most prized trophy

and won going away by five lengths in one of the most wide open Derbys in recent years.

In his wake were the stars of most of the winner preps that lead to the most famous race in America. Far behind finishing 15th was the first woman ever to ride in the Derby, Diane Crump aboard W. L. Lyons Brown's Fathom.

My Dad George. Broadway producer Raymond Curtis Flamingo and Florida Derby winner, made a late rush under Jockey Ray Broussard to finish second, half a length in front of High Echelon, with Nabaska fourth and Silent Screen fifth.

Robert E. Lehman Dust Commander's owner, admitted after the race that he

didn't have much hope for the colt's future in stakes races until nine days ago when he won the Blue Grass Stakes at Keeneland.

Nice Present "That was the same day — my 49th birthday — I got a record tiger while hunting in northern India near the Nepal border," said Lehman, who arrived in Louisville at noon

Saturday only 5½ hours before the race.

The former contractor from Paris, Ky., said he learned of Dust Commander's victory in the Blue Grass on Tuesday or Wednesday — "I get the days mixed up" — in a telephone call from Calcutta, and immediately started back to the United States.

He paid only \$6,500 for the colt as a yearling and thought little of his chances when he nominated him for the Derby, just 3½ months ago, but now he is "almost sure" Dust Commander will be a supplemental entry for the Preakness and Belmont, the other two gems in thoroughbred racing's Triple Crown.

Manganello, a 29-year-old native of Hartford, Conn., in only his second Derby appearance, said "this horse doesn't get tired" and could go the gruelling 1½ miles of the Belmont. The preakness, two weeks from now, is 1 3/16 miles and the Derby 1¼ miles.

First Big Win

Manganello, who rode Te Vega to an 11th place finish in the Derby two years ago, marked this one as his first victory in any race of \$100,000 or more, "but it won't be my last," he vowed. He has 11 years of riding experience and has finished among the top 10 in number of winners in the country for the past three years.

It was a most curious Derby. Not only did it have Miss Crump in the debut of female Derby riders, but Jockey Hector Pilar was thrown near the half mile pole when his mount, Holy Land, stumbled after running upon the heels of another horse.

Pilar was examined by a doctor at the track and taken to a local hospital as a precaution against possible back injury or ruptured spleen.

Miss Crump, who was never better than ninth in the race, said she "had a lot of horse under me" until the final quarter of a mile when "he just started running out of gas."

Dust Commander faltered as he broke from the gate, but Manganello had him back in the running and in ninth position as the field raced under the finish wire on the first trip around the one mile track.

With Rancho Lejos setting the pace and George Lewis on his heels, Dust Commander was laying sixth after half a mile and was fifth as he moved into the final turn.

After dropping back a little at the head of the stretch, Manganello found an opening on the rail and sent his colt past the tiring leaders with speed to spare.

"This horse does everything perfectly. He doesn't get tired," Manganello said after No Top Horses

In this year when there was no outstanding 3-year-old race, the Derby was turned in a mediocre 2:03.2, with fractions of :28 1/5, :46 4/5, 1:12, and 1:37 2/5. The Derby record, set by Northern Dancer in 1964, is 2:00.0.

Overlooked by the estimated 100,000 fans that jammed Churchill Downs and turned its infield into a sea of weaving colors, Dust Commander paid \$32.60, \$12.60 and \$7.

My Dad George Paid \$5 and \$2.20 and the betting entry of High Echelon and Personality returned \$4.40.

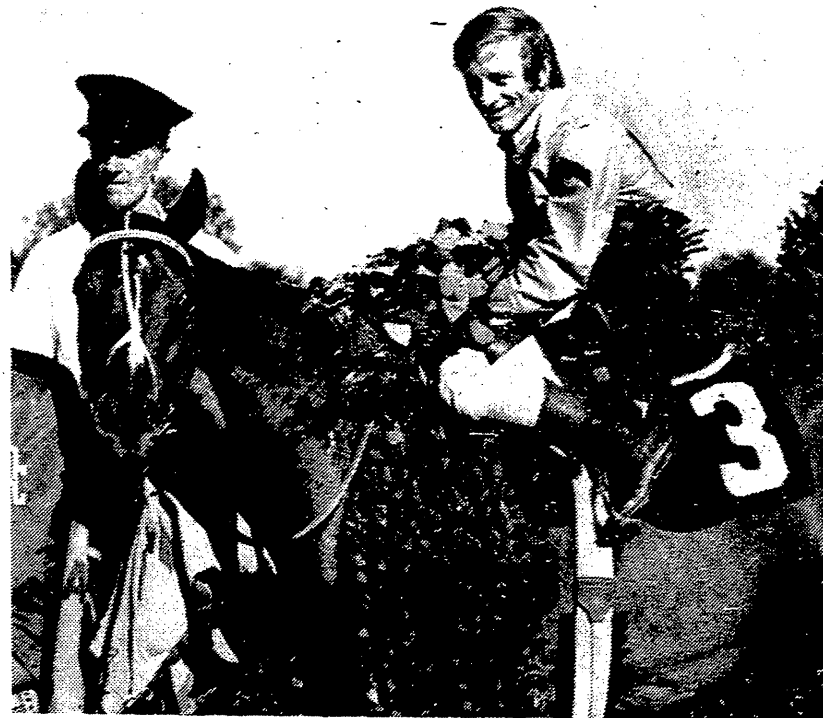

No Record Betting In Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — The Kentucky Derby crowd bet \$2,383,972 on the classic and \$3,811,127 on the 10-race program.

The totals only were topped by the record \$2,625,524 bet on the Kentucky Derby and \$6,106,346 on a nine-race program last year when Majestic Price was the winner.

Bombers Of Old Blast Brewers In Last Of 9th

NEW YORK — For a few wild, ecstatic moments, these New York Yankees were the hated, coolly efficient, overpowering Bombers of old. Almost casually they had squandered a 4-0, first-inning lead. Now it was the bottom of the ninth and they trailed the scuffling, new Milwaukee Brewers, 6-4.

But Bobby Murcer crashed a two-run homer off the upper deck facade in right field, Roy White doubled, Thurman Munson singled and the jubilant Yanks danced off the field with a 7-6 victory.

"That was the best Yankee game I've seen in years," an old-line Yankee daddy said to his young son on the way out. "Action all he way, and the Yanks pulling it out in the last of the ninth with a homer thrown in."

"That was great!" Ralph Houk thought so too. Moments before, however, he was sure enough to kick a water cooler or something. The comeback success had the manager smiling again, but he still shook his head.

"No Complaints "That's a tough script we used," he muttered, "but as long as we win I guess there's no use complaining. Maybe a game like that will be good for us. They know they've always got a chance as long as they're swinging."

This "steal" gave the Yanks three victories in a row and five in their most recent six games. After a sour start they're just one game under .500 with a doubleheader coming up today against the expansion Brewers, the usual collection of hopefuls, has-beens and fringe players.

The Yanks began this one as a real laugh. Five of the first six batters hit safely off loser Marty Pattin (0-4) — four singles, including Roy White's two-run bingle, and Murcer's double. The sixth man, leadoff Horace Clarke, walked.

After Pattin, who had a

terrible time with a Sahara Desert-like area in front of the pitching mound, stalked off, reliever Johnny Morris wild-pitched a fourth run home.

Falls Apart Fritz Peterson evoked thoughts of a no-hitter until Morris outlegged a swinging

bunt in the third. Peterson still was working on a strong, one-hit shutout when he came apart at the seams in the sixth.

Ted Kubiak, the New Brunswick shortstop who had three hits, singled in a run, homer threat Danny Walton walked to load the bases and Mike Hershberger singled to make it 4-3.

"I got to find out why Pete loses it all at once like that," Houk said. "It could be he's thinking too much about things happening."

Lindy McDaniel bailed Peterson out of further trouble, but in the eighth, he lost it. Kubiak and Ted Savage singled and Houk asked for Jack Aker, who immediately

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Phillies Lose Big... Game, Two Catchers

SAN FRANCISCO — The Philadelphia Phillies lost big at the hands of the San Francisco Giants yesterday. Not only did the Phils lose the game, 7-1, but also the services of two catchers.

Starting catcher Tim McCarver and Mike Ryan were both injured in the sixth inning of the Phils' third straight defeat.

McCarver suffered a broken right hand when he stopped a foul off the bat of Willie Mays. Later in the inning Ryan jammed a finger while tagging out the sliding Willie McCovey at the plate.

McCarver presumably will be placed on the disabled list. The loss leaves the Phillies with just one receiver, rookie as they're swinging."

McCovey did more damage to the Phillies than knock Ryan out of the game. The Giant slugger drove in four runs with a three-run homer and a double.

Catcher Dick Dietz also cracked a three run homer for PHILADELPHIA SAN FRANCISCO

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the Giants in the ninth inning. It was his seventh of the young season, tying McCovey for the team lead.

McCovey slammed his seventh after Ron Hunt was hit by a pitched ball and Mays had walked. The 365-foot shot came off loser Chris Short (2-3).

Mays' leadoff single and McCovey's double added a run off reliever Lowell Palmer in the sixth as the Giants posted their 10th consecutive victory over the Phillies at Candlestick Park.

Right hander Gaylord Perry evened his record at 3-3 with the win. He lost his shutout bid in the seventh inning when Don Money hit his second homer of the season.

Perry struck out four and scattered six hits, but needed three double plays to get out of early inning jams.

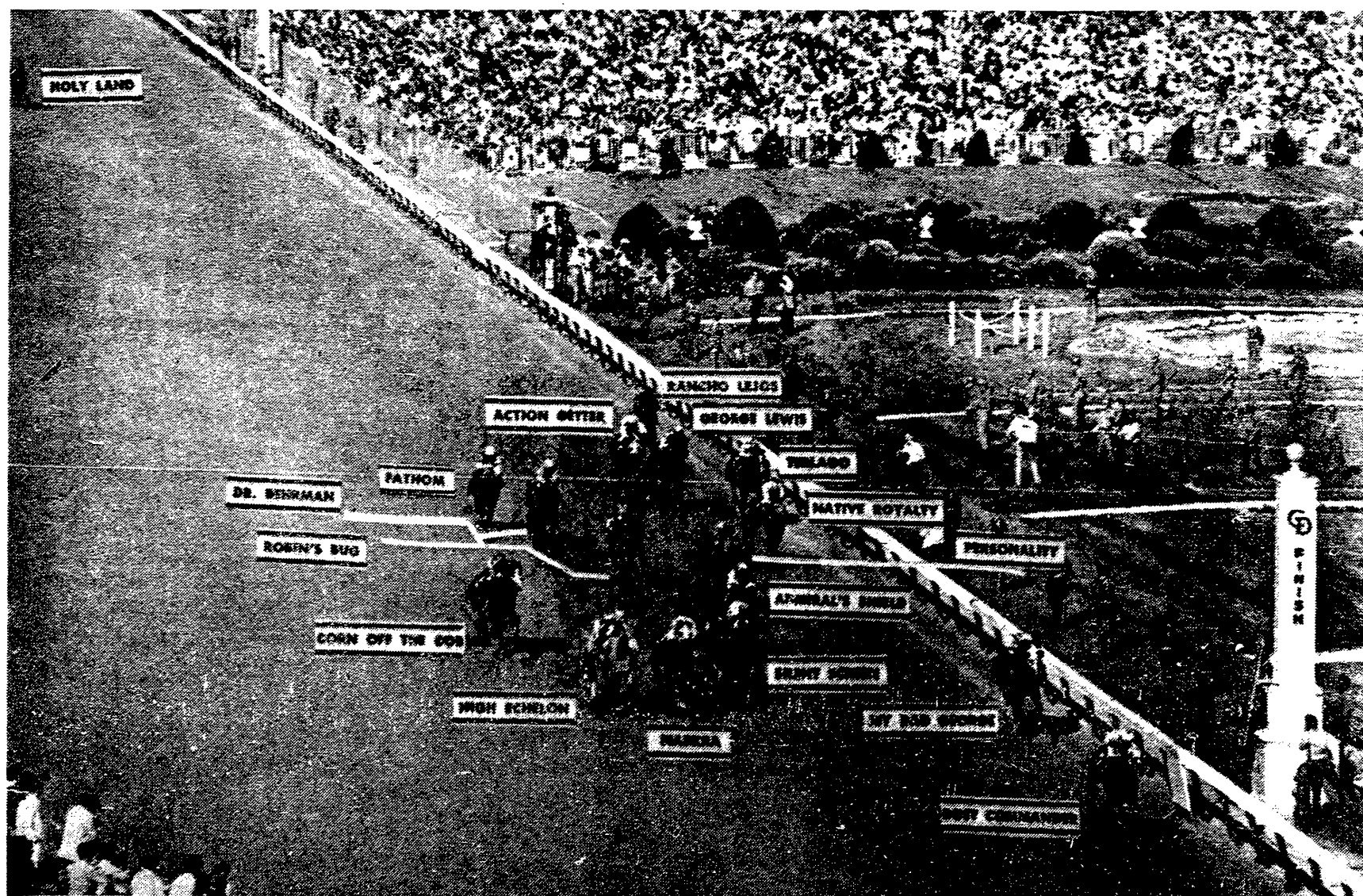
