

Guard Is Held For Shooting

Civil Action Brings Arrest After Gunfire At Smithville

(Special to the Times.) MOUNT HOLLY, Aug. 10.—John Treusch, better known as John Gsell, of Red Lion Road, Vincennes, was arrested yesterday and, in default of \$2,500 bail, was committed to the county jail.

Treusch, employed as a night watchman by the H. B. Machine Company at Smithville, was arrested as the aftermath of a shooting affray which occurred on the company's property the night of June 16, when he is alleged to have fired a bullet into the shoulder of Charles Brennan, aged 9, of 440 Hulme Street, Burlington. The shooting took place, it is charged, after the latter and a girl who was with him had been ordered off the property of the Smith estate. Brennan was a patient at the Burlington County Hospital for about a week. The arrest of Treusch yesterday was the result of a civil action for damages brought in the Burlington County Court of Common Pleas by Brennan through his next friend and brother, John Brennan.

Story of State Police According to the information obtained by the State Police who investigated the shooting, Brennan and a girl friend, in company with two other couples, had parked on the machine company's property, and Brennan and one of the girls sat down along the banks of the creek close to where the water is very deep. Treusch is alleged to have warned the couple of the depth of the water and the danger of accident, to which it is claimed, Brennan took exception and an argument followed which came to a conclusion when Treusch fired his .38 calibre revolver, as he claimed, in self-defense.

Treusch was not arrested at the time and the action against him was brought by the Brennans, father and son, in practically the first heard of the case since.

In the papers filed in the county clerk's office, Treusch is charged with mayhem and outrageous assault and battery, and the bail of \$2,500 was fixed by Judge Frank A. Hendrickson.

The H. B. Smith Machine Company is also named as a co-defendant.

Gets Cell Sentence For Breaking Window

Judge Duch in Police Court today sentenced Frank Ohlend, of Philadelphia, to serve 30 days in the Workhouse. The defendant was arrested last night on a drunkenness charge after he had fallen through a large plate glass window in a store at Broad and Academy Streets.

Gamblers Venture In 'No Man's Land'

Casino in New Orleans Resumes Its Play Near Barracks

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 10 (AP).—Gamblers ventured into the "no man's land" of the bloodless New Orleans political battle ground today undismayed by the clang of unfired weapons.

One palatial casino resumed play near the Jackson Barracks quarters of National Guardsmen who are charged, under a martial law order, with the suppression of gambling. Senator Huey P. Long, meanwhile, charged that his enemy, Mayor T. Semmes Walmesley, was making "sham raids on little 10-cent church lotto games," ignoring the large establishments.

As he spoke, National Guardsmen were in possession of the city Registration Office, which houses the books containing the names of persons qualified to vote in the September Congressional primary, in which Long and Walmesley are supporting rival candidates.

Mayor Walmesley's heavily armed police also rested on their arms in the City Hall, just across the street from the Registration Office.

Wallace, Duryee Speakers At Farm Picnic Tomorrow

Winkler's Band Attraction At Park Sunday Evening

Several hundred persons are expected to participate in the farm picnic to be held tomorrow at Sullivan's Grove, Washington Crossing Park. Henry A. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture, and William B. Duryee, secretary of the New Jersey State Department of Agriculture, will be the speakers. The day's activities will be gotten under way officially at 11 o'clock. This will be followed by sports, games and various picnic activities.

The Federal agents said no record of the sale of the barn was available in Warren County.

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Trenton Milk Dealer Fined \$25 by State

Stephen Varga, 515 Columbia Avenue, a milk dealer, was fined \$25 by the State Milk Control Board today on a charge of failing to file a report of purchases from producers. He was one of four defendants against whom similar penalties were assessed. The Seler Dairy Stores, of Philadelphia, were fined \$200 on a charge of selling milk at less than the minimum price.
