First Aid Clinic for Migratory Workers Is Held at Cranbury

PRINCETON—Members of two branches of the Red Cross which are affiliated with the Princeton Chapter are active in conducting a first aid clinic in Cranbury. The project has been designed to aid migratory laborers, and will continue two nights a week throughout August.

Demonstrations in first aid, supplemented by motion pictures, are a regular part of the program. E. Stanley Barclay, chairman of the Cranbury auxiliary, was instrumental in obtaining projector and film.

Seven members of the Allentown First Aid Squad are staging the demonstrations. They have been trained in standard advanced first aid courses, and have been certified by the Princeton Chapter. Part of their instruction, they have served regularly with the ambulance of the first aid squad in Allentown.
