MOSCOW—AP—Russia has published new documents claiming that in August, 1939, Britain offered Adolf Hitler free rein in Europe...

New Times has published excerpts from the documents, said to have been taken from the personal archives of Herbert von Dirksen...

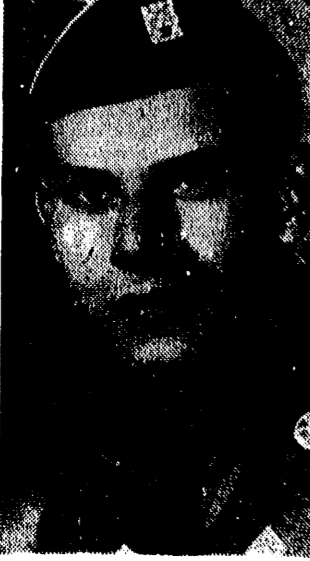

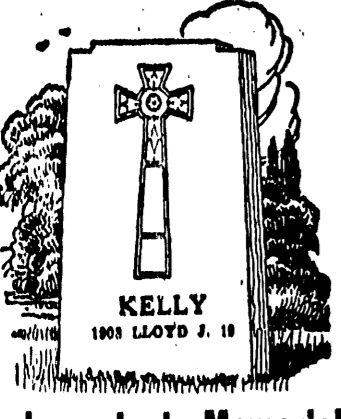

Child, 3, Is Killed Under Tombstone

ESTHERVILLE, Ia.—AP—Three-year-old James Millage was crushed to death by a tombstone yesterday when he went with his parents to the cemetery to decorate graves for Memorial Day.
