Plans Are Drawn For Parade Event On Memorial Day

Parade Marshal Arthur L. Rosenfeld of the joint memorial committee announces that detailed plans for the annual Memorial Day parade are being formulated.

The parade is scheduled to start moving promptly at 2 p. m., Monday, May 30. Route of parade will be published in the near future. It will disband at Stacy Park, where a 21-gun salute will be fired by members of the National Guard to be followed by a band concert at the War Memorial Building Plaza.

The following are only a few of the units which are expected to be in the line of march: All of the National Guard and State Naval Militia units of Trenton and vicinity with their tanks, trucks and artillery equipment; members of the major veterans organizations, a number of volunteer fire companies and their fire apparatus; several bands, including the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Naval Reserve, Martin Mayer's and many others.

Colonel James F. Cantwell, commander of the 50th Armored Division, National Guard, will act as chief of staff with aide; Commander J. F. Ducey Jr. of the Naval Militia; Albert C. Lambert, past national commander, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War; Harrison N. Williams, general chairman of the joint memorial committee and Colonel Edward B. Thorpe, past commander of Post No. 491 Veterans of Foreign Wars. Additional parade aides will be appointed at the next regular meeting of the joint memorial committee, to be held Saturday, May 14, at 8 p. m. in the GAR Hall at 207 North Montgomery Street.

All other organizations desiring to participate in the parade are urged to contact Marshal Rosenfeld at 520 East State Street, Trenton.

SPOLETO, Italy—AP—Tombs and sculptures of the early Christian centuries were discovered here recently in the basilica of Saint Gregory the Great.

While workmen demolished a baroque altar in the basilica, they discovered a Roman marble altar that bore sculptures around the base, and a hollow in the upper part. It is believed that the altar was part of a Roman temple upon which the basilica was built.

Early Christian tombs were discovered in front of the southern side of the basilica.

'Obey' Nuptial Pledge Held Antiquated

CHICAGO—AP—The use of "obey" (in marriages) in Illinois is "as antiquated as hoop skirts," Circuit Judge Julius Miner told a husband being sued for separate maintenance.

"The modern view of marriage is that it is a 50-50 proposition," Judge Miner told Glen Ford, 55, a high school band leader and music teacher.

Ford, being sued by his wife, Doris E., 51, after 27 years of marriage, replied: "I don't believe in that. The man should be the head of the house with the power to end all discussions."

"Ninety-nine percent of the people will disagree with you," the Judge told Ford. "Are you willing to bend and change your attitude—adopt the modern view and not insist on the stand of your grandfather?"

"The view was good enough for my grandfather and it is good enough for me," said Ford. "Marriage is a business. How can a business have two heads?"

Mrs. Ford's attorney said Ford refused to let his wife join the parent-teacher association and church organizations, and allowed her \$5 weekly to run the household.

Ford's attorney said when the couple was married in Albion, La., 27 years ago, Ford insisted that she take the vow to "love, honor and obey," while Ford merely promised to "love and honor."

DAV's McNerney Unit Invites Vets To Attend Clinic

Lacking necessary information, thousands of disabled veterans are not receiving Government benefits to which they are entitled, Raymond Berce, commander of Joseph McNerney Chapter 41, Disabled American Veterans, declared yesterday.

All veterans who are in doubt as to whether they are receiving full benefits were invited by Berce to call at the McNerney Chapter's clinic in the Hamilton Township Municipal Building on Greenwood Avenue any Monday from 7 to 9 p. m.

"Many veterans," said Berce, "do not understand their full rights regarding vocational training or education benefits; their entitlement to out-patient treatment for their service-connected disabilities or their rights to hospitalization when indicated."

"Many are confused over the difference between compensation and pension awards. In too many cases the veteran is neglecting the renewal of lapsed insurance because he doesn't know how to go about it. These and many other problems can be solved by consulting the clinic any Monday night."

We welcome any veteran in this area to our service clinic. We will be happy to assist without charge in filing or preparing a claim.
