Christmas Eve Vigil Dutch Listen For Animal Talk

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP)—In the still of the last hour of Christmas Eve a man and his wife steered to the stables and got softly inside, alert for the slightest sound. "Hear anything yet, Martha," the man says after a while. "Not yet, Paul," she replied, "but soon. Yes, we shall hear them soon."

They stay until midnight, the dawn of Christmas itself, listening to the converse of the farm animals who serve them throughout the year.

This is one of the finest hours in the lives of the Pennsylvania Dutch.

For the farmers in particular, believe that anyone who keeps a pig in barn or stable between 11 and 12 o'clock on Christmas Eve will gain the gift of understanding animal talk.

So Martha and Paul, like many before them and many on this same night, are living up to the Pennsylvania Dutch belief that the animal sounds take on special meaning and are comprehensible to human beings, this being a good omen for the new year.

The Pennsylvania Dutch farmer builds many of his Christmas Eve hopes around the barns and the farm stock. Great store is set by what is called farmer's dew, a kind of rustic elixir. His mystic peepery is thought to be so beneficial that farmers haul hay into barnyards on Christmas eve so that it may be moistened by the dew. If that hay is fed to the stock the next morning, so the story goes, none of the animals will be lost in the new year.

The charm works in other ways as well. For example, many a mother puts pieces of bread out doors, beyond reach of snoring creatures, and after the dew has moistened the bread it is given to the children. That assures no harm will befall them in the coming year.

Born of superstition and perpetuated by custom, these folkways are among the quaintest in the country.

Payless Yule For Teachers

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Public schools here closed today for what normally is a happy holiday season—10 days off for students, Christmas pay checks for teachers and administrative personnel. Not this year.

The students will have their holiday, but for 4,000 teachers and other personnel, caught between the federal courts and the State Legislature in the integration fight, today appears likely to be a payless yule, barring a miracle.

The Legislature has cut off the Orleans Parish School Board's funds because the board complied with federal court integration orders.

Some hope for the board appeared Wednesday when a three-judge federal court ordered four New Orleans banks to release some \$728,000 in school board funds it had frozen. It also ordered the city to turn over to the board \$20,000 in taxes that have been held in escrow.

But with appeals from the ruling likely, it was not clear if the board actually would get the funds immediately. And with payrolls totaling about 1.9 million, even these funds would not be enough.

Hickey Grabs Senate Seat

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—Gov. Joseph J. Hickey, first Democrat to become Wyoming's governor in more than a decade, announced yesterday he will take over the Senate seat left vacant by the death of Republican Keith Thomson.

Hickey, 49, said he will resign shortly, and that Secretary of State Jack Gage will serve the remaining two years of the governor's term.

Thomson died of a heart attack at Cody, Wyo., Dec. 9, little more than a month after he was elected to the Senate seat now held by Democrat Joseph C. O'Mahoney.

Thomson, 41, was completing his third term as U.S. Representative. O'Mahoney is retiring after serving nearly continuously in the Senate since 1933.

"I am working on the mechanics of the change-over in state government," Hickey told a news conference yesterday.

Highway Children Are Party Guests

Santa Claus made a pre-Christmas visit to a group of about 300 children of New Jersey State Highway Department employees yesterday afternoon at the Highway Department headquarters here for the seventh consecutive year.

The event was the annual Christmas party of the department which has been personally sponsored by Highway Commissioner Dwight R. G. Palmer each year since he took over in 1954.

The children, whose ages ranged from one to eight years, were treated to a full-scale puppet show featuring David Seville's three chipmunks, Alvin, Simon and Theodore, prior to the arrival of Santa and his distribution of individual gifts, candy canes, balloons and gift-filled stockings to all kiddies present.

Trenton Area Institution Projects Given Priority

The New Jersey institutions for delinquent girls at Allentown has approved at least part of a sweeping revision of the state's male reformatory system — a new \$17 million dollar reformatory.

The board yesterday included \$7.5 million for a start on the new institution in its plans to spend \$42 million on new mental and penal facilities. The money would come from a penny increase in the cigarette tax and a proposed \$30 million bond issue.

Lloyd B. Wescott, president of the board, told a news conference it would start awarding architectural contracts as soon as money from the added tax begins coming into the state treasury.

The increase, raising the cigarette levy to six cents a pack, is due to take effect Jan. 6. It is expected to produce \$12 million in 18 months, when it would lapse if the bond issue were approved at a referendum in November 1961.

The board spent most of the day setting up tentative priorities and, as expected, gave top ranking to \$17.5 million worth of fireproofing projects at Trenton and Greystone State Hospitals and a new \$13,154,000 colony for the mentally retarded. The 1,000 bed colony will be built on state-owned farmland on the south side of Rahway Prison Farm.

Harry Von Bulow, now superintendent of the Woodbine colony, was named to head the new institution.

In Order of Priority The board listed these other projects, in order of priority for the \$2 million building program: A \$1,375,000 unit for defective delinquents at the Johnstone Training Center.

\$1,750,000 worth of improvements, including an infirmary, at the Menlo Park Soldiers Home. \$143,800 to improve security at Rahway Prison Farm.

A new \$11.6 million medium security prison for 500 inmates at Leesburg.

About \$300,000 worth of improvements at Bordentown Reformatory.

About \$1,446,000 worth of improvements to the State Home for Boys at Jamesburg.

About \$866,000 worth of improvements at Annandale Reformatory.

\$7,471,000 for a start on a fourth state reformatory.

The board's master construction plan also includes \$15 million for another new colony for the mentally retarded and \$4,893,000 for replacement of units at the new Lisbon Colony.

The institutions board also announced: 1. Appointment of Miss Mildred B. Conley, a psychiatric social worker at the State Home for Girls in Trenton, as superintendent of the new Turrell Group Center.

Girl, 14, Arrested For Shoplifting

DOYLESTOWN — A 14-year-old Frenchtown girl has been picked up here after a shoplifting spree in which she hit several local stores for some \$200 in cash and several dresses.

According to Sgt. Kenneth C. Cutt of the Doylestown police, the girl arrived at the Doylestown Inn on Monday with \$80 she had stolen from the wife of the Frenchtown chief of police. She took a room at the inn, paying four days' advance rent. She told the clerk she was a student at New York University and was on her way home to California for Christmas.

The girl, who police say has an excellent record as a high school student, is now in the Bucks County Juvenile Detention Home. She probably will be returned to Hunterdon County where the disposition of the case will be handled, authorities said.

Scouts Mark Washington's Crossing Site

Boy Scout Troop 1776 of Titusville will commemorate Washington's historic Christmas Night crossing of the Delaware by placing a wreath at the spot where the boats landed on the New Jersey side.

The annual wreath laying, usually is done on Christmas Day but has been put off until 11 a. m. Monday because Christmas is on Sunday this year.

The wreath, made by the troop's Wolf Patrol, will be placed at the foot of the monument marking the spot of the landing. Dirk Van Dongen, superintendent of Washington Crossing (N. J.) State Park, will speak at the ceremony. John Daggett is scoutmaster.

Robber Spurns Coins, Gets Shot

Mrs. Parker told police the robber ordered a steak sandwich and when she put it on the counter, the thug shoved his hand in his pocket saying, "Get me some money." Police said the man was found to be carrying a piece of wood in the pocket.

She offered him a coffee can containing change.

The handi spurned it, saying, "Get me the green." Mrs. Parker said. She reached under the counter for a .32 caliber revolver and began firing.
