Advice Is Given For Tomato Blight

FLEMINGTON, Aug. 17.—From the county agent's office comes the information that blossom end rot, which has been common in many tomato fields this year, is caused by a disturbance of the water relations in the plant and not by disease-producing organisms as the term "rot" might imply. Blossom end rot is usually most common in bright, hot, dry weather, when the absorption of water by the roots does not keep pace with the loss of water from the leaves. Under such conditions water is withdrawn from the fruit by the leaves, causing the dark brown or black, shrunken, leathery area of tissue at the blossom end of the fruit, which is the characteristic symptom of the disease.

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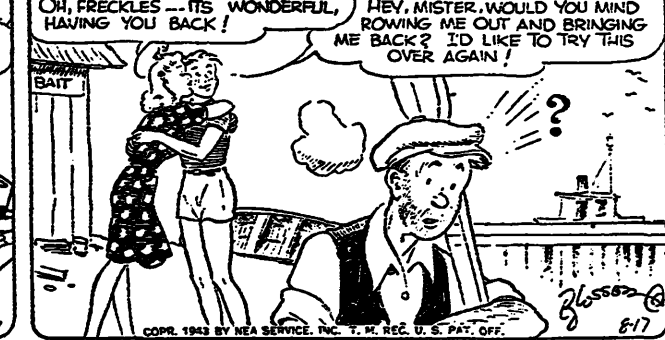

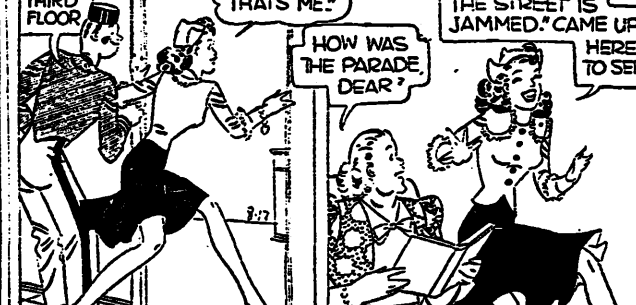

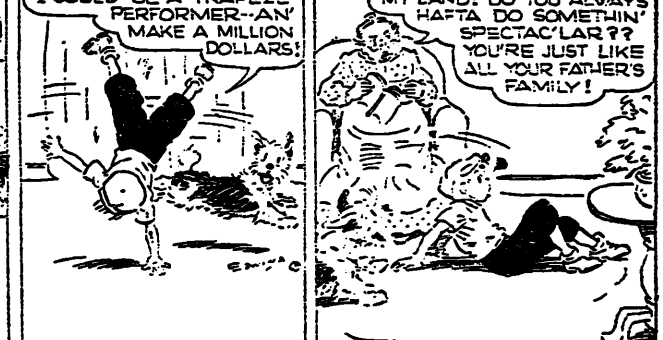
