Bralynski Found Injured In Car at Washington Crossing Park

Police officials of Hopewell Township declared yesterday that they had brought Adam Bralynski to Mercer Hospital after he had suffered injuries in an automobile accident Saturday when his car crashed into a tree.

The 55-year-old WPA worker, employed on a project at the Washington Crossing Park, died Wednesday in the hospital as a result of a punctured lung.

The accident occurred, it was

stated by police, as Bralynski was driving from the park. The victim, who lived at 345 Centre Street, was found sitting in the auto by Carlton E. Force, chief of police of Hopewell Township, and a park guard.

Chief Force, who was accompanied by his brother, J. Chester Force, and Raymond Cadwalader, both of Titusville, said he brought the victim to the hospital here, where he was taken to the emergency room and placed in charge of hospital attendants. Believing that the man was not seriously injured, they left the institution.

The funeral will be held from his home tomorrow morning at 8:15 o'clock. Solemn requiem high mass will be celebrated in St. Stanislaus Church at 9 o'clock, and interment will be in Holy Cross Cemetery, under direction of M. Winowicz & Son.
