Elephants are with the show and there will be exhibitions of daring horsemanship as well as all manner of performing domestic animals.

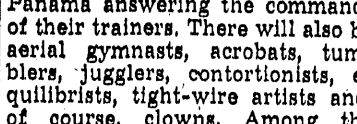

Document Of Mexican War
Added To Library Collection

The Public Library has received as a gift of Mrs. Joseph A. Yard of Freehold, an interesting old document which will be added to the Library's collection of local history manuscripts.

Signed by about two hundred soldiers from this vicinity who fought in the Mexican War under the command of Captain Joseph A. Yard of Trenton, the document reads as follows:

"Camp near Matamoros, Mexico, March 2nd, 1848. Capt. Joseph A. Yard, Sir:

The non-commissioned officers and privates of the 10th Regiment cannot allow you to depart, without expressing their sincere and heartfelt sorrow for your severe indisposition.

During the time you have been with us, you have proved yourself an honor to the service, a Father to your Company, and the true friend of every soldier; we will indeed be devoid of every feeling of gratitude if we ever forget your many kind and generous acts which justly entitle you to be named the soldier's friend. You may be assured that on your departure you will be followed by the good wishes of all; and a lively hope that providence will shortly restore you improved in health and spirits to your
