It is accordingly to the credit of five members of the Board of Education that they had the disposition and found the means of remedying this discrimination...

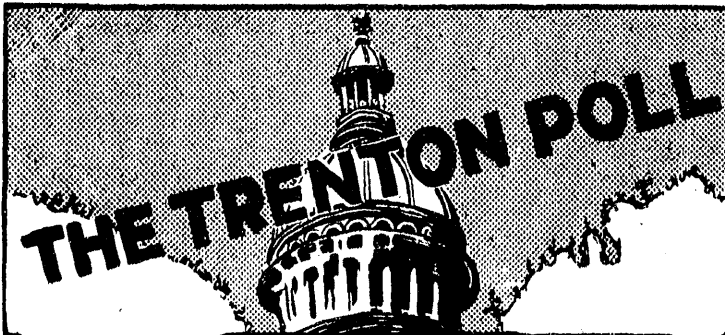
Democracy In Jersey City

His story of his four-hour chat with Ingrid had me crying into my wheats, and I imagine it plunked the heartstrings of millions of straphangers...

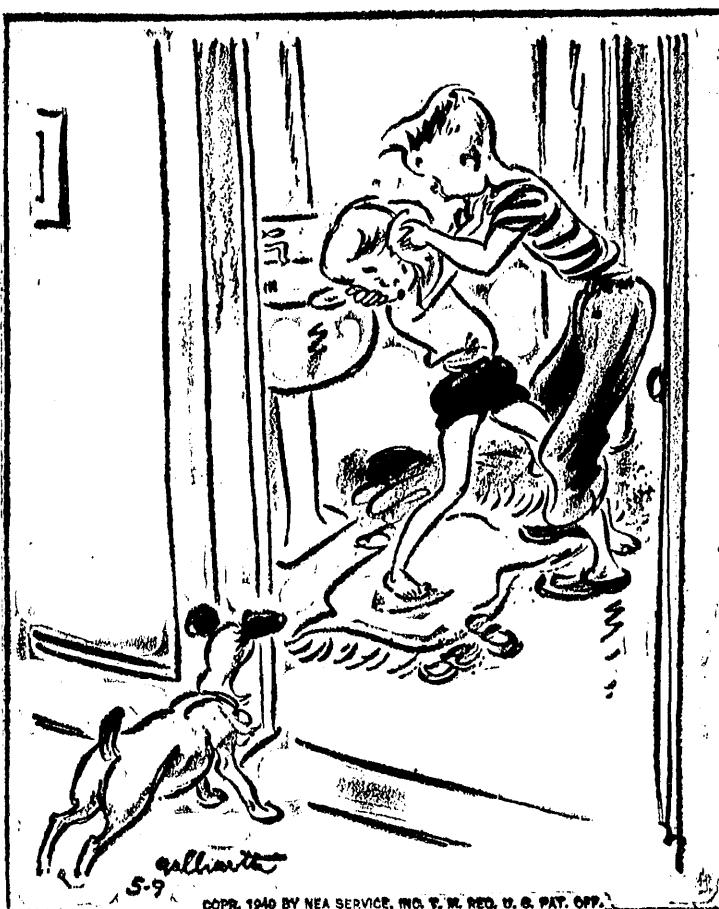
