

Chief of JWV To Be Visitor Here Sunday

National Commander Jackson J. Holtz of the Jewish War Veterans will pay an official visit to New Jersey Sunday.

He will arrive in Trenton at the Clinton Street Station at 10:15 a. m. He will be met by a committee headed by Colonel Benjamin P. Shein and Erwin Wainer, together with Mayor Connolly and members of Trenton Post 156 of the JWV.

A motorcade under the direction of Harry Gittleman will escort Commander Holtz to the Stacy-Trent where the group will attend breakfast. The event will bring together members of the post, their friends and representatives of the Jewish Community of Trenton.

Albert Finkle, newly-elected commander of Post 156, and A. Harry Glogoff, are co-chairmen of the program for "Holtz Day."

At noon Commander Holtz will be escorted to Burlington in a motorcade headed by national executive committeeman Sidney W. Frankfurter of Burlington. There he will be greeted by members of the Joseph W. Wolf Post, JWV, at a reception. In the evening Holtz will be the principal speaker at a function in Camden.

Holtz, a former member of the Massachusetts Legislature, is the youngest commander to head the JWV. He is 42.

The committee on local arrangements is headed by Past Commander Daniel Rappaport, Jack Silverstein, William L. Aaronson, Sol Gittleman, Dr. Leon C. Nurock, Burton Peskin, A. Brown Edelman, Benjamin Rubin, Julius Susman, Herman Strauss, Harry W. Stahley and Benjamin Paley.

Rural Life Sunday To Be Observed

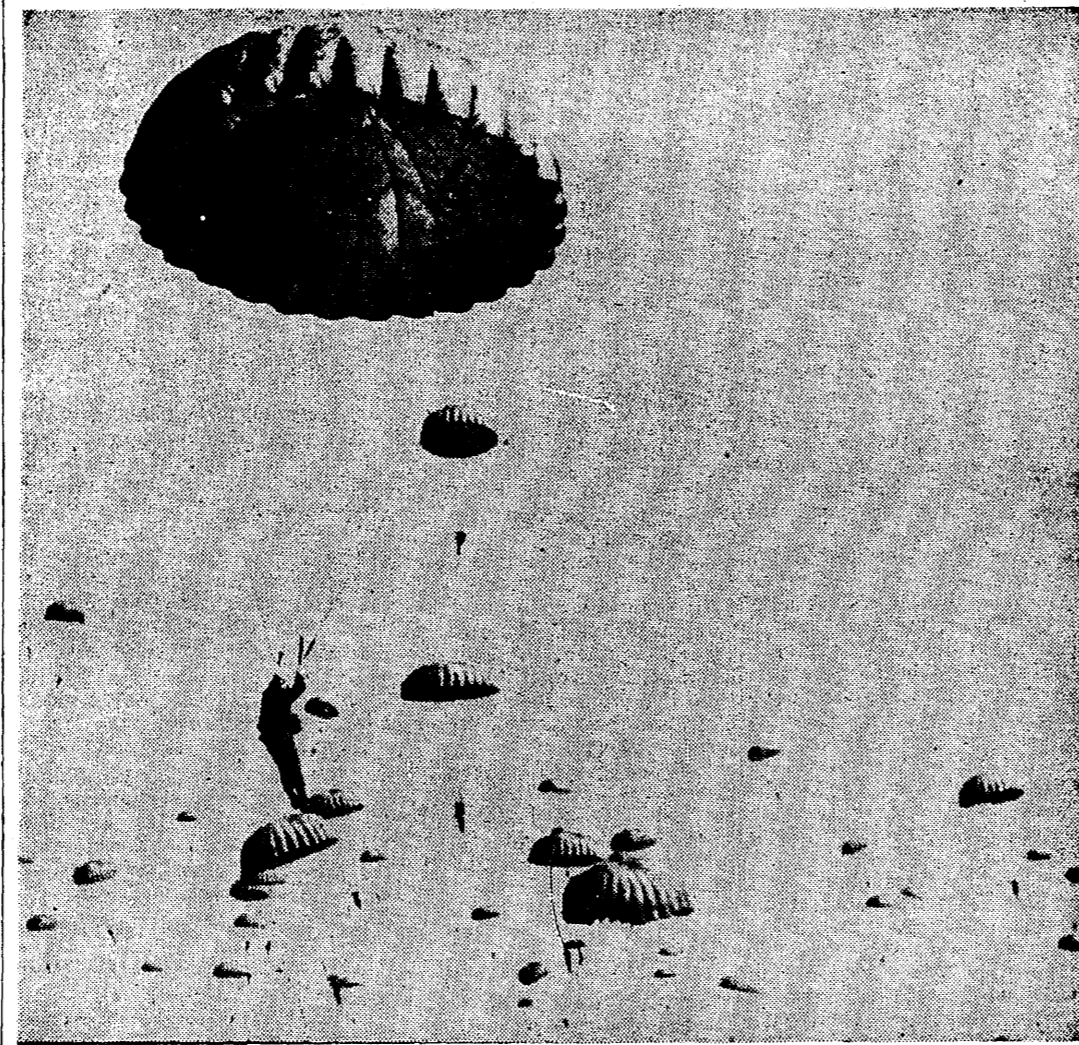
MOUNT HOLLY — Rural Life Day will be observed throughout the Diocese of Trenton on Sunday by designation of Bishop George W. Ahr.

William S. Conklin, secretary to the Division of Employment Security and chief of public relations, will be the toastmaster.

Bar License Deal Okayed

The sale by James Manziap of the liquor license for a bar at 21 Centre Street to Melindo, Ilio and Persio Perse was approved yesterday by the City Commission. The commissioners also gave the Perse brothers permission to transfer the license to a new location at 559 Emory Avenue and to operate the business under the trade name of Perse's Tap Room.

An application by Paolo Filliponi, proprietor of Paul's Roma Garden at 17 East Front Street, for permission to serve alcoholic beverages in a new second-floor dining room was also approved by the commissioners.

A request by the Roebing Wine & Liquor Company for permission to transfer its tavern license from 845 Chambers Street to a new location at 825 Chambers Street was withdrawn before the meeting.

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It's Blossom Time In State's Parks

For a pleasure drive over the weekend the Department of Conservation suggests a visit to one of the State forests or parks. Spring flowers and budding trees provide a colorful picture.

Dogwood should be nearly at its peak over the coming weekend at Belleplain Forest in Atlantic and Cape May Counties, according to a department bulletin. Japanese cherry trees are in blossom at the Washington Crossing Park and Princeton Battlefield Monument.

In addition, Washington Crossing Park offers rebud a flowering crab apple trees. Hackleberry, Stokes, Yucca and Jenny Jump Forests are spectacular with hepatica, dog-toothed violets and a variety of other flowers.
