downtrend at most tracks throughout the country.
The handle totaled \$47,504,543

compared to the 1949 figure of \$48,981,885. Attendance this year was 679,-640, down only 5,476 from last

Wednesday and Saturday programs at Atlantic City will bill nine races. It will be the first time since 1942, when racing was approved in New Jersey, that nine races have been held in one day at any track in the State.


