FLURRY IN SENATE OVER REVALUING OF R. R. PROPERTY

Senate Passes White Slave Bill-- 25 More Auto Inspectors-- Other Measures.

TRENTON, March 9.—There was a partisan flurry in the upper house yesterday when Mr. Silzer offered a resolution calling for a report from the Governor's special commission to re-value railroad and canal property. He declared the commission had spent \$19,991.56 and had made no accounting. He also said that another appropriation would doubtless be asked of this session. Mr. Fielder, of Hudson, supported Mr. Silzer, but the resolution was referred to the Judiciary committee at the instance of Mr. Gebhardt, the Republican leader, despite vigorous Democratic protests.

It is said Governor Fort is preparing a special message on this subject in which he will ask an additional appropriation of \$50,000 for the completion of the work.

Bills Passed.

Among the bills passed by the Senate were: Appropriating \$5,000 for a battle table at Chestnut Neck, appropriating \$5,000 for an armory at Camden, legalizing the Washington Crossing National Park Commission, increasing to \$25 the amount which may be paid to discharged convicts and authorizing the appointment of twenty five additional automobile inspectors.

Bills Introduced.

Among the bills introduced was one creating the office of State beekeeper and one giving the State Board of Health control over the State oyster beds. Mr. Bradley introduced a bill requiring foreign corporations excepting insurance, banking, ferry and railroad concerns, to file charters, etc., with the Secretary of State before doing business in New Jersey.

Bills in House.

The House passed a bill to enable cities to pay pensions to war veterans who have held municipal office for twenty-five years, also one making it a misdemeanor to knowingly assist a criminal to escape, one prohibiting the imprisonment of minors for debt.

The Senate's "white slave" bill also passed the House. If Governor Fort signs this measure the holding of women for immoral purposes may be punished by imprisonment up to thirty years.

Interstate Bridge. Assemblyman Moore, of Passaic, introduced a bill providing for a new interstate bridge commission to investi-

gate the New Jersey-New York bridge proposal. It carries a \$3,000 appropriation. Assemblyman Tamuly, of Jersey City, introduced a rapid transit commission measure which will enable Jersey City to establish a subway system when such improvement is desired.

Assemblyman Radcliffe introduced a series of fish and game bills, providing for a State game farm, an enlarged force of game protectors, a five year closed season for deer and other safeguards for game and fish.

Hits Whiskey.

The Senate Health committee gave a hearing on Senator Gebhardt's Pure Food bill, which especially prohibits the adulteration of whiskey. Counsel for liquor associations opposed the measure on the grounds that it was drastic.

KILLED BY MANIAC NEAR BANK

Policeman Shot Dead by Man Who Demanded \$400,000.

Bridgeport, Conn., March 9.—After mailing threatening letters written in blood red ink to John D. Rockefeller, J. P. Morgan, Cornelius Vanderbilt, Yale and Berlin universities, President Taft and rulers of half a dozen foreign nations Gustave Frederick Karl Mueller, a maniac, set out from his father's home to shoot up the bank officers of which had refused to deliver to him \$400,000.

Apprehended by the police at the door of the bank, Mueller shot and killed Policeman Ellsworth G. Dietz, fatally wounded Rocco Leopold, a barber, and wounded Thomas P. Dougherty, a wealthy building contractor.

Fleeing through the crowded streets, with the police in pursuit, Mueller was himself shot and wounded by Pat O'Mann John Brown, the leader in the chase, and captured after a pursuit of three blocks.

Mueller was committed to the State hospital at Middletown last June after a lunacy commission had pronounced him insane, but was afterward released in custody of his father.

DR. IREDELL ATE BEAR STEAK

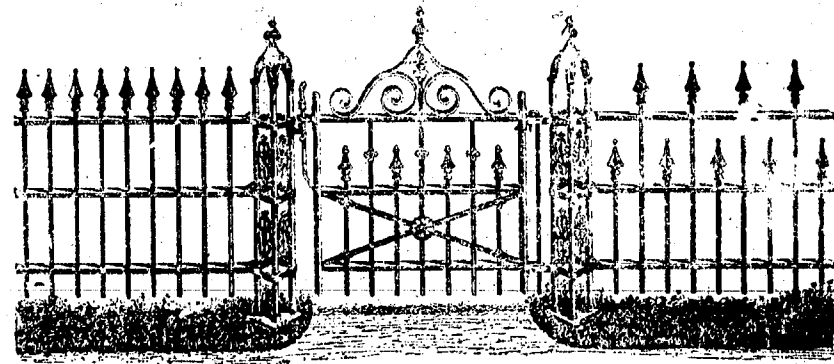
