### TAFT'S SECRETARY SENT TO MOROCCO

Named as U. S. Minister Because Health Is Threatened by White House Job

WASHINGTON, May 28.—President Taft yesterday appointed his secretary Fred Warner Carpenter of St. Louis, Mo., as United States Minister to Morocco, to succeed H. Percival Lowell. The appointment was made by the President to succeed Lowell, but it is likely that he will appoint Rudolph Forster, the present assistant secretary.

The following statement relative to Mr. Carpenter's nomination was made at the White House: "The appointment of Mr. Carpenter to Morocco was made on his own application to be relieved of the duties of secretary to the President, which had been so heavy upon him as to threaten his health. The President thought that as Morocco had a healthful climate the change of duty which this would afford was wise, and consented to Mr. Carpenter's resignation of his present position. Mr. Dozier, who is the present Minister to Morocco, is to be transferred to another post. No person has been selected as yet to succeed Mr. Carpenter."

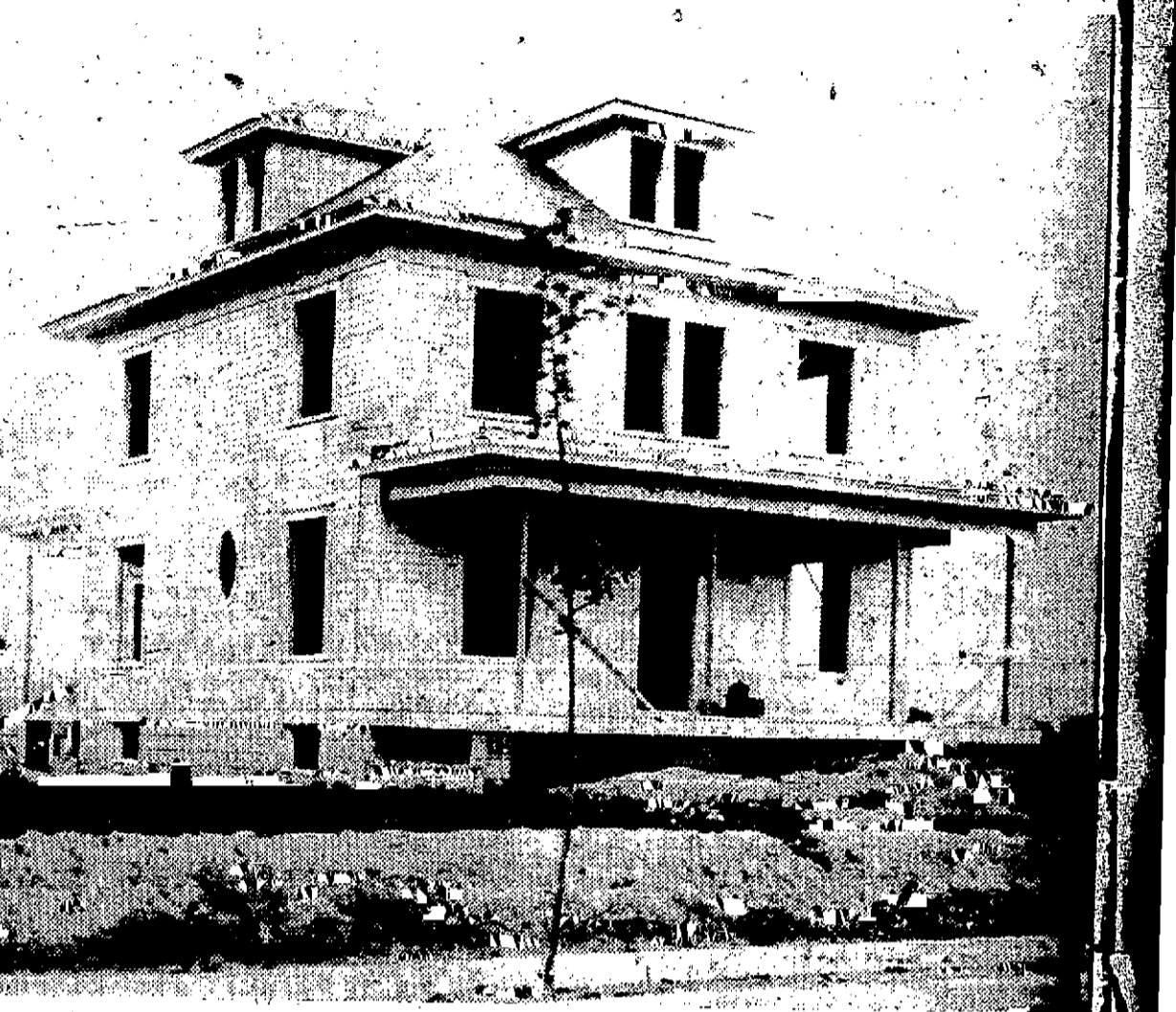
