31 Indicted At Mt. Holly

One Count of Involuntary Homicide After Auto Crash

MOUNT HOLLY, May 6.—Only 31 indictments were returned by the May Grand Jury in its first report after three days of deliberation here yesterday. Seven of the indictments were against fugitives, and Judge Frank A. Hendrickson ordered them impounded.

One indictment for involuntary homicide as the result of an automobile accident was returned against Charles P. Dittman, of Riverside. Dittman was driver of a car which struck and killed Robert A. Marshall, of Palmyra, on a street in the latter town last January 14. Prosecutor Daniel Lichtenthal said that Dittman is charged with driving at night without his car lights on. Marshall was walking across the street when hit by Dittman's car.

Arthur R. Kelly, of Florence Township, was indicted for atrocious assault and battery on Joseph Garbush, of Roebling. The incident occurred at the Roebling plant last March 11, and Kelly is charged with assaulting Garbush with an iron pipe. Garbush was in serious condition from the injuries for some time after the affair.

An indictment also was returned against Raymond Whitmore, charging him with escape from the State Prison Farm in Chesterfield Township. Whitmore was sentenced to State Prison from Camden County.

Burlington Drive Goes Over Top

Red Cross Campaign Closes—Total Exceeds \$10,000 Quota

BURLINGTON, May 6.—Burlington's Red Cross War Fund campaign has finally gone over the top with total contributions received to date amounting to \$10,011.90. J. J. Robinson, campaign chairman, announced today. Sincere thanks is expressed by Robinson and by Richard Devereux, Burlington Red Cross branch chairman, to everyone who contributed in any way to the success of the drive. Burlington's quota of \$10,000 was the largest ever set for a campaign of this nature in this city, and the response to requests for contributions has been most gratifying, Robinson declared.

Decision Awaited On Artesian Well

No Objection Made To Plea Offered By Burlington

BURLINGTON, May 6.—No objections by individuals or nearby municipalities were made to the application of the Burlington City Board of Water Commissioners for permission to develop an artesian well water supply here, at a hearing on the application held in Trenton Tuesday before George S. Burgess, a member of the State Water Policy Commission.

Benjamin A. Sleeper, president of the Burlington Board of Water Commissioners, and Alonza Shin, superintendent of the water works, represented the city at the hearing. The application was received by Commissioner Burgess, together with results of inspection surveys by State inspectors, and the matter was taken under advisement. It is expected that a decision will be handed down within the next two weeks.

The Board of Water Commissioners plans to divert a maximum of one million gallons of water daily from artesian wells to supplement the present water supply, which is taken from the Delaware River and treated with various chemicals before it is ready for use.

A test well is being driven on the grounds of the water works to determine the quality and quantity of water available at that point. A screen needed for that well has been received, and drillers resumed work yesterday. If the water supply from the well proves satisfactory and the State Water Policy Commission approves the plans, additional wells will be driven on the water works grounds.

Student Service Board in Session

Farmers Needing Help Should Apply To Nearest School

FLEMINGTON, May 6.—The Hunterdon County Commission for Student Service recently acted in accordance with 1942 State Legislation permitting school students to work on farms during time when schools were in session and moved to help alleviate the farm labor shortage by petitioning the State commission for authorization to release students for farm work.

On April 26, this permission was granted and schools were so notified through the office of the county superintendent. The State legislation provides that a student may be excused by school authorities up to 15 days during the school year to work on farms. Farmers in need of student help are being requested by the County Commission to apply to the nearest high school or elementary school where boys and girls 14 years of age and over are available.

Pressure Cookers Being Rationed

FLEMINGTON, May 6.—Pressure cookers are rationed by the County Farm Machinery Rationing Committee and those who wish to buy should make application at the office of the County USDA War Board in the Court House, at Flemington.

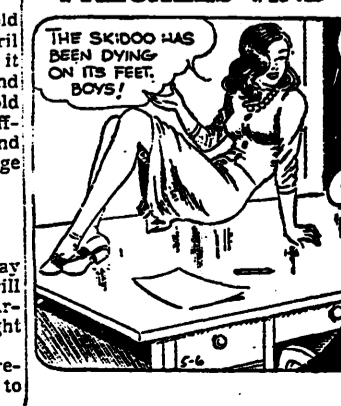
The ration committee will not issue a purchase certificate until satisfied that the applicant knows where a cooker can be obtained. This information should accompany the application.

The local farm War Board has complete information about priority assistance procedure required for the purchase of most any article needed on the farm or in the farm home. The board is also prepared to assist farmers in making application for priority assistance to the War Production Board.

Purchase certificates are no longer required to buy fencing of any kinds. The dealer is authorized to sell without restrictions under an amendment to the farm machinery rationing order.

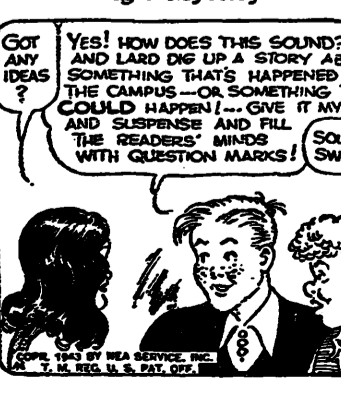

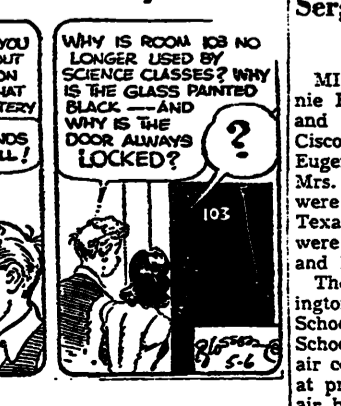
