GM Sales Are Up, But Profits Drop

NEW YORK — Net sales of the General Motors Corporation in the first quarter of 1951 increased by more than \$317,000,000 over the volume achieved in the corresponding period of last year, but earning for the latest quarter showed a decline of more than \$70,800,000. The decline in the net profit was due to the sharply higher provision for taxes and the increased cost of materials and labor, C. E. Wilson, president, and David P. Sloan Jr., said in the quarterly report to 457,000 stockholders.

135-Year-Old Bible Group Advances Job

NEW YORK — AP — Had you lived in New York when James Madison was President, you might have read in one of 22 daily papers published here on May 10, 1816 that some well-known citizens met that day in City Hall.

You would have noticed that John Jay, first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, novelist James Fenimore Cooper and Dr. Lyman Beecher were among those who met in a maple-paneled room to arrange for the "distribution of the Scriptures without favor of comment."

They founded the American Bible Society that Spring day 135 years ago. The organization is still going strong but it has added some twists that would rock that distinguished assembly back on its well-polished heels.

Consider, for example, the new, slick-paper magazine. Half-filled with photographs, just published by the society. It's the Gospel of Saint Luke, dressed up in the format of a weekly magazine to make it easier to read for more people. Other Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles are slated for the same streamlined treatment.

With approximately the same number of words as "Gone With the Wind," the Bible has proved a tough book to squeeze down to pocket size — but the American Bible Society has done that, too — and made the print large enough to read with ease.

"The society has done everything but publish a Bible especially designed for reading in bed — and that may come yet," says Dr. Robert T. Taylor, one of four general secretaries of the organization.

Since its foundation, the society has turned out more than 300,000,000 bibles in all shapes and sizes and in 40 languages for distribution all over the globe.

Through agreements with 19 foreign Bible societies, the American society avoids translation duplications. If the British society publishes a bible in Icelandic, the other societies turn to other tongues.

From its two offices here, one on Park Avenue, the other on the edge of Greenwich Village, the society distributes bibles in 55 languages for use in this country alone. The largest number of foreign language bibles published for U. S. distribution are in Spanish. Hungarian ranks second.
