Morrisville Water Issue Comes To Head This Week

MORRISVILLE — There seems to be a good chance that Morrisville's annual water shortage problem will finally be solved this week—provided Borough Council follow the recommendation of its consulting engineers.

Francis S. Friel, a member of the Philadelphia engineering firm of Albright Friel Inc., has sent to each member of Council and the Municipal Authority a definite recommendation that the contract for an iron removal plant at the borough will be awarded to the Graver Water Conditioning Company of New York.

This apparently clears the way for Council and the Authority, when they meet together Tuesday night, to award the iron removal plant contract to the Graver firm. Once an iron removal plant is installed, the borough will be capable of adding nearly a million gallons a day to the borough's tight supply.

The Graver firm, with a price of \$21,592, was the low bidder on the job of installing the iron removal plant—almost \$19,000 lower than the only other bidder, the Aquatrol Ferr-X Corporation of Clifton, N. J.

Councilmen Split
Despite this big saving, Council has been arguing since last fall over award of the iron removal contract. One group of Councilmen—spearheaded by Councilmen James Magee and William Schreiber—has contended the contract should be awarded to the low bidder.

During this six month period, Council has asked for bids on the iron removal plant, thrown out all bids which were received, re-advertised for new bids, directed the Authority to award the contract to the Graver firm, rescinded that action, and then directed the Authority to award the contract to the Aquatrol Ferr-X Corporation.

Delay Is Cited
Friel, in his report to Council and the Authority, said he found that neither the Graver nor Aquatrol Ferr-X firms qualified under a strict interpretation of the specifications drawn up by Council. Because of this, he said, the

Familiar Suburbanite Still Active, His Health Good

TITUSVILLE — A familiar figure around here is Andrew Williams — and that's not unusual because he's lived in these parts since 1894.

Mr. Williams who was 95 years old on March 18 lives alone now on Brick Yard Road. He does all his own housework and cooking. Mrs. Williams was 88 years old when she passed away on April 8, 1954. They had no children.

Longevity runs on both sides of the family. Williams' father lived to be 105 years old.

Born in Ohio and raised in Virginia Mr. Williams who is one of Titusville's oldest residents, first moved to Red Bank and then to Lambertville before arriving here.

He now raises chickens and pigs as a business. He has been a Republican for 70 years; is a member of the Lambertville Baptist Church. He has enjoyed singing all his life.

Complaining of only a little arthritis in his shoulder and hands Williams claims never to have been sick. He has never worn glasses.

A lifelong student of the Bible his motto always has been "Love thy neighbor as thyself." Living by his motto he has always been on hand to help others in need.

Mount Holly May Revise Curfew Law

MOUNT HOLLY — This county seat's existing curfew law is expected to be overhauled by Town Council on Monday, June 8.

Councilman Morris K. Perinchief Jr. suggested a 10 p. m. curfew for local youngsters at the May 2 meeting of Council, after noting that "many young boys and girls are on the streets late at night."

Perinchief commented that "it is important we consider the matter, as it would be of tremendous assistance to the police department."

Mayor William S. Vaughan and Town Manager William P. Hatch pointed out to Perinchief that Mount Holly already has a curfew law, but he thought it restricted the curfew to children under 16 years of age.

"We have no serious juvenile problem here," Hatch reported, although agreeing with Perinchief that some youngsters are on the streets late at night. He said most of them, however, were from 18 to 20 years old, but Perinchief insisted that "too many of them are 16 and younger."

Perinchief, reporting he did not wish any immediate action be taken until the matter was investigated, suggested that Hatch look up the old curfew law and report at the June 8 session.

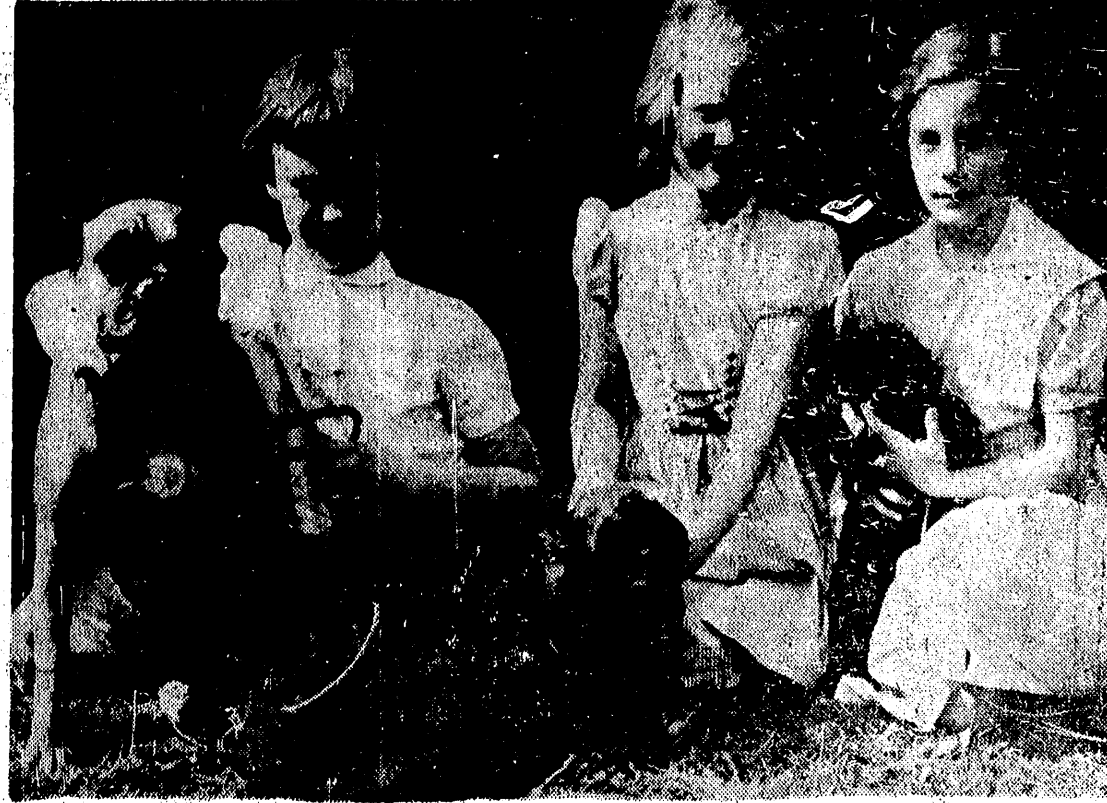
